"Much work last week," he said, 475 men were employed in work relief projects here; the total showing a decrease of 25 men from the previous two weeks ago. On Monday last, the records showed, 177 men were engaged to work on relief projects against 138 similarly employed on Monday of the preceding week.

PROSECUTOR PUTS DECISION TO BOARD

County Attorney Calls Attention to New Law Dealing With Warrants' Issuance

Prior to the adoption of a new state law, county prosecutors were not authorized to issue county warrants to persons delinquent in payment of taxes, but, G. W. Williams, Twin Falls county attorney, said in an opinion delivered to the county clerk yesterday, but the law does not prohibit the issuance of warrants under such circumstances.

The opinion plainly leaves the decision as to the course to be followed up to the commissioners.

Under the old order, a list of delinquent taxpayers was provided for the county auditor's guidance in issuing county warrants. Claimants who had not paid their taxes did not receive warrants.

The county attorney's opinion is: "The bill of 1931 has been approved by the governor and is now by virtue of the emergency clause, in full force and effect. It is the opinion of the attorney that I call your attention to this for the reason that heretofore you have not authorized to issue warrants to persons who had not paid their taxes. This new law does not prohibit you from issuing warrants, because of said reason."
