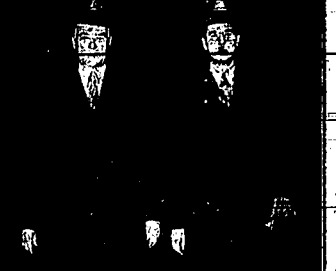

CITY COUNCILMEN STAND ON RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENTS

R. E. Bobier, Mayor, T. J. Douglas and T. Sanderson, Commissioners, Outline Policy of "Pay As You Go"

R. E. Bobier, mayor, and T. J. Douglas and Thomas Sanderson, commissioners, made the record at Twin Falls city election, yesterday gave out the following statement of their policy, and of an accomplishment of the councilmen which have been a part:

1. Financial—They have kept the city on a sound financial basis. They have not been a burden on the taxpayers. They have protected and will protect the city against any and all claims for money which are not due to pay off bonds, and will cut down the need for future tax levies just that much.

2. Water Department—Water rates had to be increased to pay for necessary work on the system. Nearly a year ago the city council, by passing a resolution, have all of the bonds paid off by 1940.

3. Power Plant—They have spent much time, and their own money, studying this matter. Whenever they can, they will find a practical and profitable power plant site for the city, or whenever one of the kind is suggested to them for the city, they will bring such a proposition to the vote of the people as promptly as possible.

4. Permanent Improvements—In addition to reducing the city's bonded debt \$400,000, and building up an unexpended reserve of more than \$250,000, they have put in and paid for permanent improvements and necessary new equipment, costing more than \$100,000, such as 13 miles of cast iron water mains, concrete bridges, storm sewer catch basins, improvements at filter plant, paving replacements to new power-flushing plants, and a new sewer main grade for other streets, and many other things; all without levying any bonds, without getting out any warrants that could not be paid promptly, and while keeping the city on a cash basis.

5. Economy of Operation—They have reduced the city's operating expenses for the past year 20 per cent.

6. Above is our record. Our policy has been, and it will be, to plan the city's work so that we can pay as we go; to keep the city on a cash basis; to protect the rate of unpaid taxes so that when the taxes are paid in they will go to the bond fund; and to cut down the bond payments come due; to effect economies in the city's operation whenever and where ever that can be done without jeopardizing the safety of the people, or the safety of their property and the property for which the city is responsible.
