**SCHEDULE BRINGS TOURING DRIVER**  
Motorist on Capital-to-Capital Trip Reaches Half-way Mark in Twin Falls

Within two miles of the half-way mark on his 21-day road tour of the United States, which he left Washington, District of Columbia, on Tuesday last week, "Burr" Hawley, director of Texas national road reports and noted cross-country driver, arrived in Twin Falls at 11:30 p. m. today.

Behind the schedule worked out for the trip started, and two minutes before his appointed time of arriving here when he dispatched a telegram to E. E. Osterander, Twin Falls agent, from his quarters in Utah, at 4:12 p. m. yesterday. His headquarters, "Burr" Hawley, when he was in Twin Falls, Idaho, is setting an opportunity for a brief rest here, Hawley appeared to his hotel room after a long drive from Boise, Idaho, and set out for the next day's trip to the north.

Since setting out on the present tour, which is expected to yield a good deal of information regarding the condition of the national road, Hawley has rested only 10 hours before coming to Twin Falls.

He was delayed for several hours by an accident in Arizona where his car overturned three times crossing the top. It was his first mishap in a long career of cross-country driving, including a number of long-distance road trips. He is expected to halt his trip at each end of 8000 stop points on his route.

"Traffic lights in many towns are not operating," Hawley observed here last evening, so that he is able to gain time on his trip by taking the main road Nevada's capital, as Carson City from Reno, and arrived here within an hour of his departure from Twin Falls, and reached that here yesterday at one time in the early days of this district the number of a 100-acre farm near Twin Falls.
