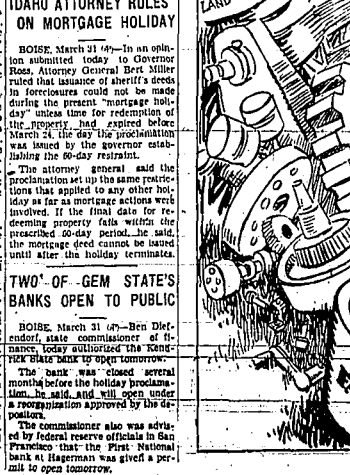

JEROME BOYS AND FATHERS ASSEMBLE

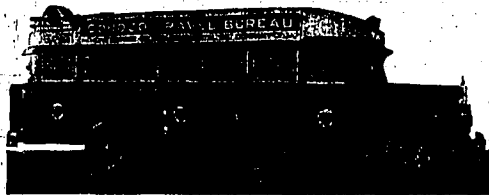
Members of Scout Troops on North Side Receive Badges At Program in Church
