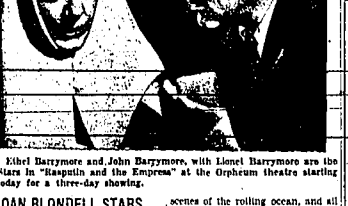

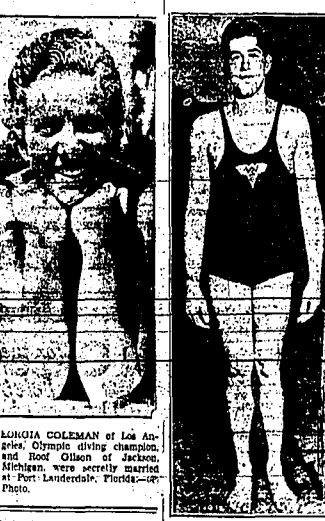

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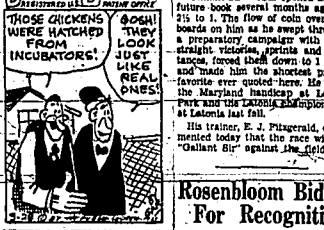

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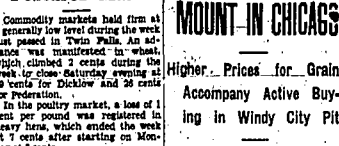

Payment of \$125,000 Principal and \$1750 Interest Cuts Off Half Million

Yesterday's bond and interest payments caused the district to drop into the red. The district is owing a radical reduction of the district's 1932 tax levy. District H. Taylor, secretary, said, "Just the district had on hand, after making these payments, a remaining reserve of only about \$2000."

Under the schedule of bond redemption payments inaugurated in 1930, the Twin Falls highway district will wipe out its entire bonded debt with a final payment on April 1, 1939, six years hence.

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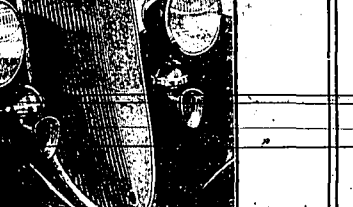
