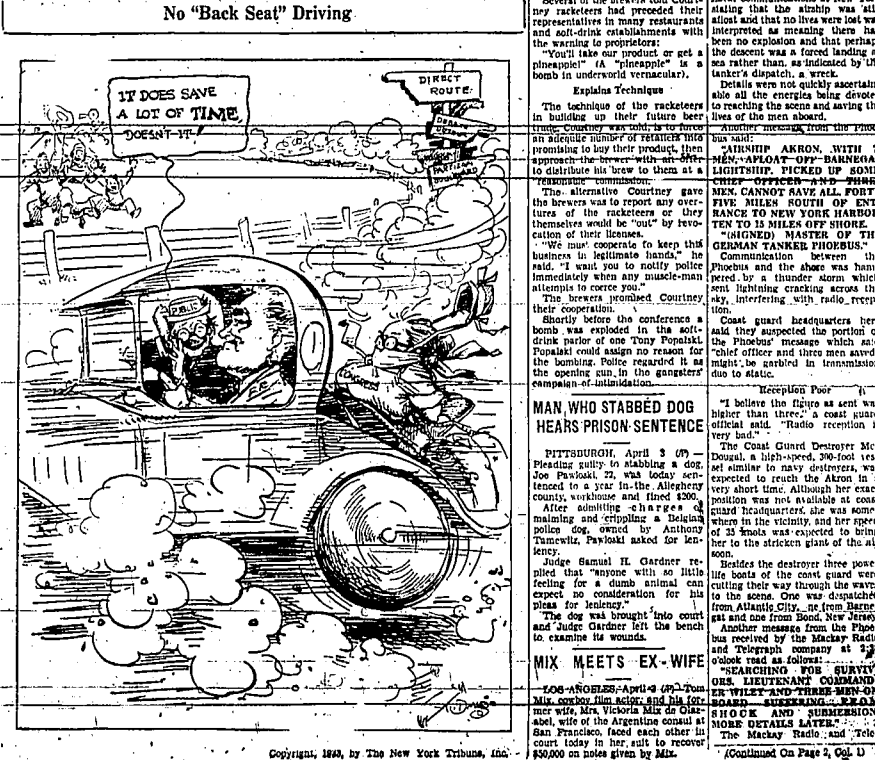

VINCENT REMAINS ON STATE PAYROLL

Commissioner of Education Becomes Executive Officer Of Board in Few Weeks

BOISE, April 3 (AP)—W. D. Vincent will continue as commissioner of education until May 1 and from then until July 1 will serve as executive secretary of the board of education under plans of the board announced today.

The board of both the duties of commissioner and of state superintendent of public instruction will fall then on the state board of education. No appointment was provided in the bill for additional clerical help. The board of education will be in session with Governor Ross.

The superintendent, after July 1 will be acting as a member of the board of the board in relation to elementary schools and in the same capacity with the state educational institutions. In addition he will have to prepare a report on the distribution of the public education funds among the schools in the state as well as to prepare the larger share to poorer districts. At present the fund is distributed in direct proportion to school population.

The board considered the possibility of employing an accountant to audit the state's accounts. It was decided to hold up action pending the forthcoming meeting.

Will Meet in Gooding The board will meet April 24 in Gooding at the state school for the deaf and blind, and on succeeding days at the state school for the blind, the southern branch of the university at Pocatello, and the state school for the deaf at Boise. On June 12 the board will go to Moscow to attend the commencement exercises of the university.

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Experts Pick Yankees And Pirates To Win League Titles

Seventh Annual "Pennant Poll" Grips Attention

Baseball Scribes With 500 Batting Average to Credit Since 1927 Select Probable Victors for 1933

By ALAN GOULD (Associated Press Staff Editor) NEW YORK, April 3.—Seventh annual "Associated Press" pennant poll has been started today and its credits since 1927, points today to the New York Yankees and Pittsburgh Pirates as the probable victors of the 1933 major league baseball season.

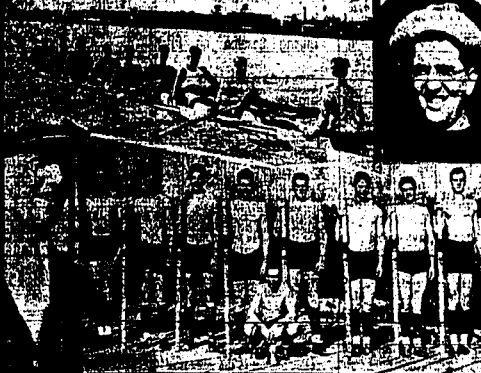
The opening of the season barely a week off, four expert Yankee voters over all clubs, although noting especially the improvement of such clubs as the Washington Senators and Chicago White Sox. The same critics, however, figure the Pirates have added sufficient strength to overcome the Chicago Cubs, tactically since the league champions lost "Kiki" Cuyler.

Yanks Rate Highest Baseball fans favor the Yankees to repeat and thereby claim their eighth pennant since 1927. An even dozen see the Senators to spring an upset, or, at the worst, take second place away from the Yankees. The chances of the Chicago Cubs as the pennant winner are slight, but this represents a distinct falling off in support for the Macqueen. Sentiment shifts to the White Sox apparently inspired one solitary pennant vote for the Chicago club.

The constant also reveals the high esteem in which the great slugger, Hank, his big bat attracting enough votes to make the White Sox the choice over Detroit for fifth place. This is higher than the Sox have had in five years.

The National League ballots totaled 81, of which 43 picked the Pittsburgh Pirates to remain champions and two in a row. The Pittsburgh Pirates have been named the favorite in the Associated Press poll as probable pennant winners and they lead in batting average. The Cubs justified the predictions of the experts by winning in 1927 and 1928, but since 1929 they have not won.

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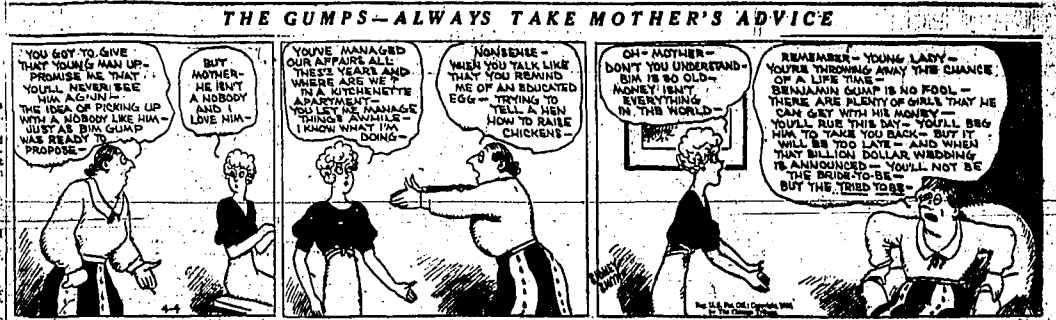

Total of these loans was \$7702, individual loans ranging from \$42 to \$1400, maximum loans in most instances covered all of the crops to be grown on described premises.

Loans bear interest at the rate of 6 1/2 per cent per annum, and are to be repaid on or before next October 1.

Crop mortgages covering the amount of the loans were filed in the office of the county recorder yesterday.
