DEATH TOLL TOTALS 173 IN MOST COSTLY CRASH IN HISTORY OF AVIATION

Vessels Search In Vain to Find More Survivors Hope for Lives of Missing Men, Plunged Into Ocean In Wreckage of Akron, Vanishes as Hours Pass

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, April 5.—A crash in the Atlantic of the first big flying ship of the Akron, early Tuesday of the day, was the most costly disaster in the history of aviation with only three of 78 men saved.

Hundreds of vessels, naval and civilian, were concentrated in the Bay of Biscay, but failed to renew with the dawn the pursuit of the "hulk" chance that others might have been saved.

Two of Crew of Seven Die In Second Naval Air Crash Off East Coast

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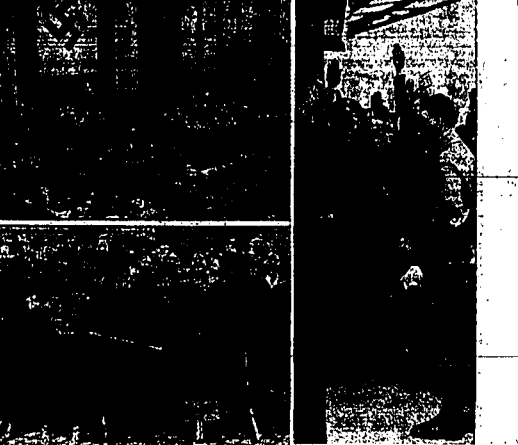
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When Hitler Assumed Dictatorial Power

IDAHO EDUCATORS FAVOR NEW FUEL Agricultural Experts Labor On Plan to Blend Alcohol With Gasoline for Motors

MOSCOW, April 4 (Special to The News)—Why not convert agricultural alcohols into a new and economical fuel? This proposal of Harry Miller, assistant agricultural engineer, and R. B. Sawyer, professor of agricultural chemistry at the University of Idaho, these men have been working for more than a year on a project to blend alcohol made from farm products with gasoline to greatly increase its efficiency. The main agricultural products featured in the research work are corn, wheat and potatoes.

Research workers in several universities in the country have been working on this same problem, but it is believed that the results obtained at Idaho are most significant. The project has reached such an advanced stage that results are being secured on the special blending process by which alcohol is mixed with the gasoline.

Increase Mileage
Miller and Sawyer undertook this project as a part of the university program of attacking the problem of agricultural reproduction. The idea is to use alcohol in a mixture containing 20 per cent alcohol and 80 per cent "third tractor" gasoline. This gives a mixture 20 per cent greater than could be obtained in the same car from the premium grades of gasoline, Miller reports.

They point out, however, that it is impossible just to pour alcohol into the tanking. A special blending procedure is necessary to produce proper results. Alcohol can now be produced from potatoes at a cost of 10 cents per gallon. Coal potatoes will do as well for this purpose as good potatoes.

"The most of utilizing agricultural products would not be detrimental to the petroleum industry because as a result of the farmer's marketing a higher price for his products the tractor would keep its place on the farm and would be burning 80 per cent gasoline," explains Miller. Increased mileage and lower cost of fuel would induce people to use more automobiles.

Outlet for Wheat
In estimating how this development would affect Idaho agriculture, the researchers point out that in 1931 the consumption of gasoline in the state was \$2,292,000 gallons. Had this amount of gasoline contained 20 per cent alcohol it would have provided an outlet for about 5,000,000 bushels of wheat annually.

The average annual production for the state, or about 7,000,000 bushels of potatoes, would only meet the state's average annual output.

It is the belief of Miller and Sawyer that when sufficient demand for alcohol is developed to warrant its production on a large scale it could be put to many other uses. For fuel in kitchen stoves, incinerators and brooders; as a raw material for the production of ethyl alcohol, which is essential for the production of acetic acid, and as a raw material for the production of other alcohols.

Europe Uses Alcohol Fuel
Based on the motor fuel consumption and the other possibilities mentioned, the Idaho experimenters estimate that alcohol consumption for the United States readily would provide an outlet for about 2,000,000,000 bushels of corn, or 23,000,000,000 bushels of wheat. At present the nation's wheat crop averages only about 850,000,000 bushels, or 230,000,000 bushels of wheat. The potato crop slightly over 2,000,000,000 bushels and the potato crop about 300,000,000 bushels.

Foreign countries are now using ethyl alcohol prepared from starch for motor fuel. The use of alcohol as a motor fuel has been prevented from coming into general use by deposition of carbon in such way that only a skilled operator can maintain such an engine. If an alcohol-blended fuel could be deposited in such a manner that such a motor, its general use would be expanded.

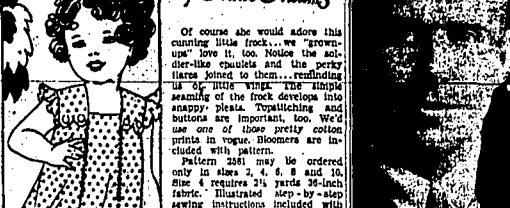

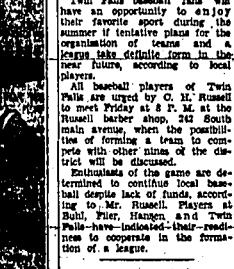
