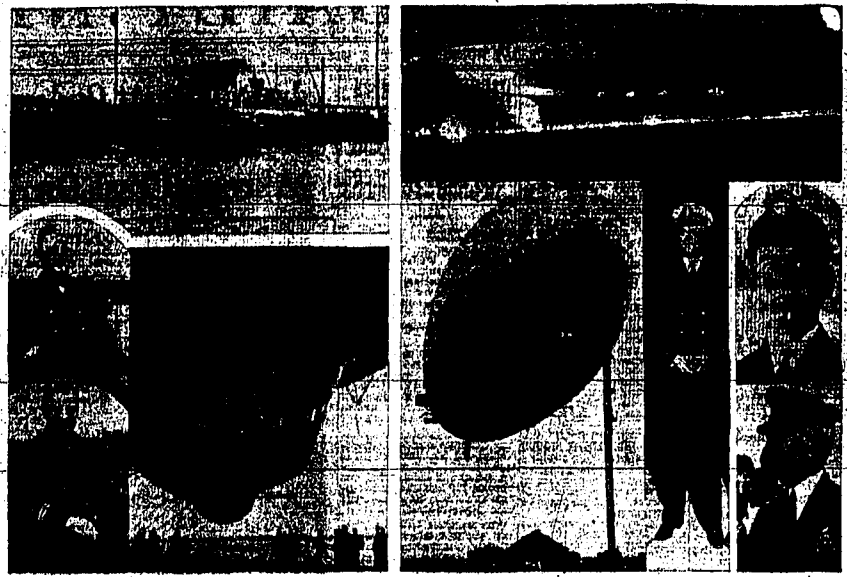

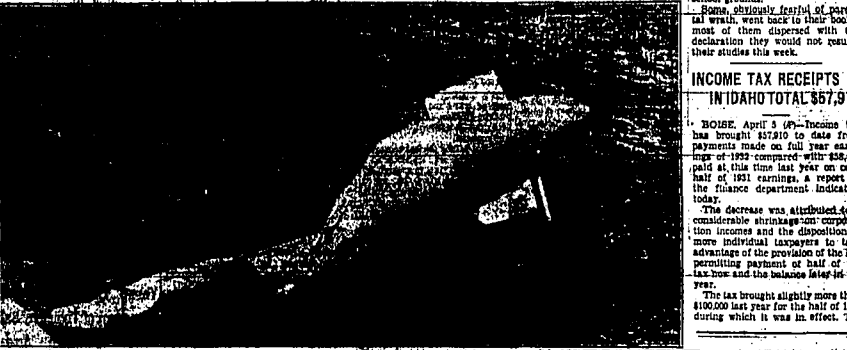

HOURS AFTER the United States Ship Akron was reported down at sea off the New Jersey coast only four men of 76 were known to have been picked up. One of them later died. 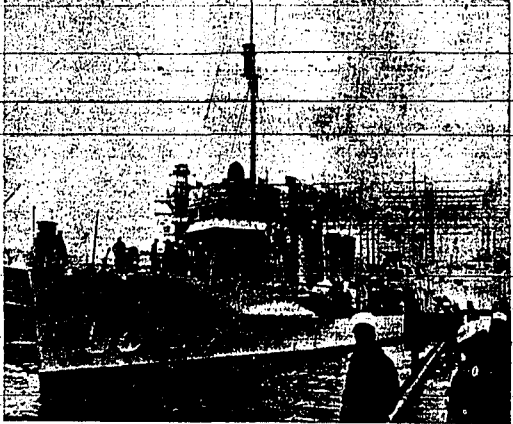

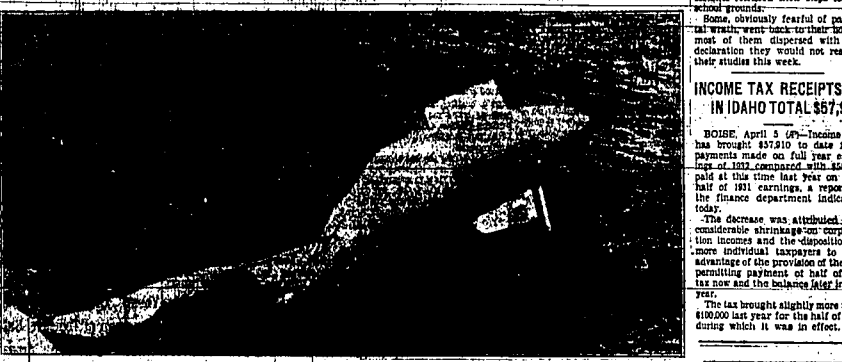

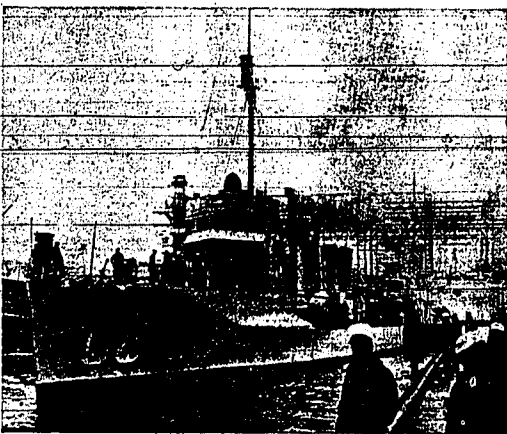
