GUARDS WATCH DEFENSE COUNSEL FOR NEGROES

DECATUR, Ala., April 6 (AP)—National guardmen tonight were placed on duty at the apartment hotel of Samuel S. Labovitz, chief of defense counsel, in the "Scottsboro case" as reports were received that a crowd had formed at 21½ street to come here.

Each of one of the state's principal witnesses in the first trial at Scottsboro two years ago who appeared here unaccompanied this afternoon in the trial of Heywood Patterson, was under Labovitz protection until court opens tomorrow.

Captain Joe Burleson, commanding the guard, said early tonight he had checked the reports and believed them unfounded, but guard units with automatic rifles were kept stationed at the apartment as a precautionary measure.

PREPARES TO DRINK

SEATTLE, April 6 (AP)—Washington state prepared to night to drink some beer after 13 years of drought.

There wasn't enough ready in the breweries of Seattle, Tacoma and Spokane, and what there was presented a difficult problem in transportation, with hundreds of trucks lined up for an all night rumble across the state to smaller cities.

Seattle had a mere 80,000 pints ready, and Tacoma had only 250,000 pints to send over 2000. Of draught beer, Seattle had only 100 31-gallon kegs available.

Canada had plenty of beer, and it was legal to ship the 32 kind over the border, but high tariffs ruled the media and nullified the expected supply almost to nothing.

Seattle had been promised 8-cent beer and at the last minute the price was raised to 10 cents. Most other Washington cities had 10-cent tariffs by the time, and bottled pints were priced at 15 to 20 cents.

Figure on employment and revenue in connection with beer were not available tonight, as license applications came in a rush at the last minute.

Most Washington cities had licensing ordinances, but some towns and cities decided to permit unlimited selling unless regulation became necessary.

The best supply of really aged beer in the state was at Ocoee, in the possession of A. S. Staples and Richard Graham. Graham found six bottles in 1923 while digging on the site of the old Ocoee brewery, 30

GOES ON SALE

PORTLAND, April 6 (AP)—A supply of 100,000 more than 24,000 pints of legal beer will go on sale throughout Oregon tomorrow. Within 15 minutes after the sale starts, the state's two breweries estimate this supply will have evaporated and not before Saturday or Sunday will shipments from outside the state arrive.

The Portland brewery had 70,000 pints on hand. The brewery at Bend had a stock of about 12,000 pints. Neither was to make delivery during the night.

In municipalities draught sales were to be restricted generally to restaurants. Grocers, drug stores and service stations could handle bottled beer. Since there is no state regulatory act, dealers outside of towns were permitted to sell it any way they pleased.

With supplies so limited growers planned to restrict sales to two pints to a customer. The proposed price was 15 cents a pint, a nickel for a six-ounce glass, and a dime for a tall one.

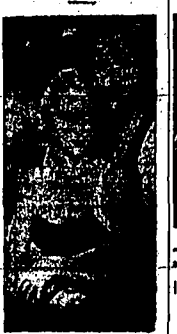


