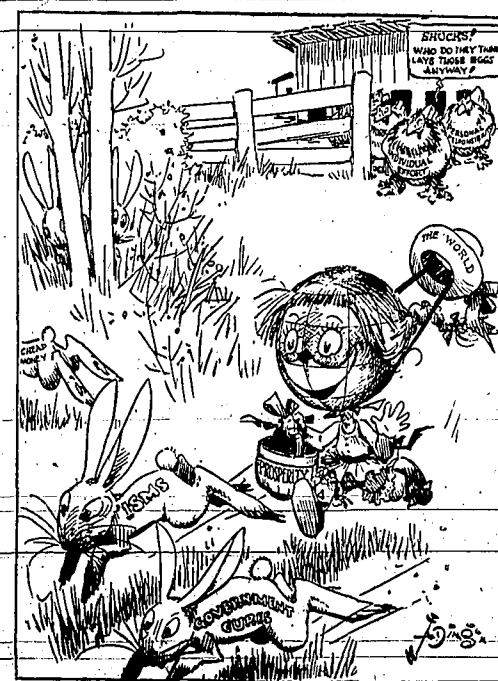

#### Twin Falls Council Receives Legal Advisor's Opinion In Collection Proceedings

A committee of Twin Falls paid improvement district paving bondholders in starting suit for collection of delinquent assessments, has taken responsibility for collection of such assessments out of the city's hands, Council No. 6, Tuesday, Twin Falls city attorney, advised the city council in a written opinion submitted at a meeting of the council last evening.

The suit for collection, the city attorney said, is a matter to be decided by the court's jurisdiction.
