**Authorized Tariff Change Promise Substantial Cut In Transportation Cost**

Substantial reductions in freight rates on beans to eastern markets are forecast in advices which have come to The News from the Illinois Central system's Salt Lake City office. Copies of the advices were turned to the hands of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce and the state public affairs committee. The advices for the reduced rates has not yet been announced.

# GOODING PROJECT SOON OFFERS 68 FARM UNITS

**BURLEY, April 22 (Special to The News)**—About 68 farm units will be available for entry on the Gooding extension project in the near future. Soldiers, sailors and officers who have served in the army or navy have preference of entry, between May 15 and August 15.

All prospective entrants, whether ex-service men or not, will be required to make an application to the military, farm and irrigation experience, and available capital. Before a board of examiners. None will be permitted to make entry unless they give evidence of being capable of carrying through a farming project with success. Application blanks can be obtained at the reclamation office at Burley or at Shoshone.

Farm units vary in size, approximately 80 acres. The cost has been set at \$2,000 to \$3,000 in cash and statements. The lands open for entry, lying in three townships north and west of Burley, were recently examined by J. H. Mitchell, assistant reclamation accountant, who has declared himself fully impressed with their agricultural possibilities.

**Reduce Salaries**

Reduction of teacher and employer salaries resulted in \$10,647 being slashed from the budget set for last year. The present budget was fixed for \$35,500. This is the lowest budget put into effect in the past 10 or more years. The cut this year is approximately 15 per cent through the entire system making in all a cut of approximately 30 per cent in a period of three years or since 1930, Superintendent Carter stated when the budget called for \$41,903.

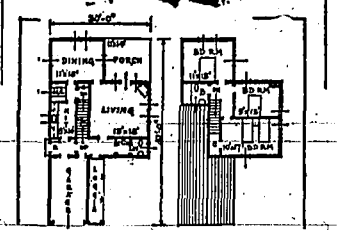

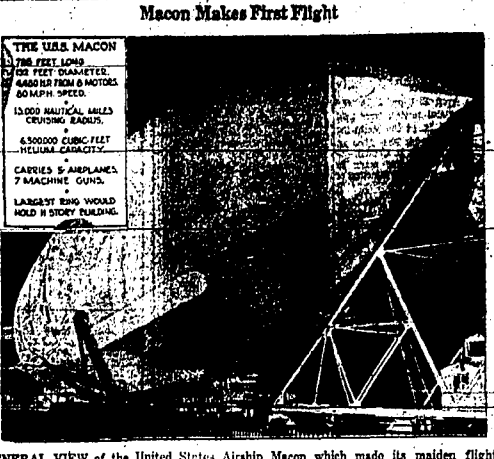
