MOTHERS' PENSIONS EXCEED ESTIMATES

Twin Falls Commissioners Spread Appropriation by Reducing Higher Payments

A \$120,000 county budget appropriation is not sufficient to meet demands for mothers' pensions in Twin Falls county this year, according to a decision which the county commissioners reached yesterday in consideration of the budget officer's report showing that \$2745 of the \$120,000 appropriation had been expended for the first three months of the year.

In order to balance resources and expenditures on this account, the commissioners voted yesterday to reduce by 20 per cent for the remainder of the year all mothers' pension claims in excess of the minimum \$10 a month.

Under provisions of the mothers' pension law, which commissioners have registered as being retroactive like the old-age pension law, a pension of \$10 a month is paid to mother and one child, with an additional \$3 a month for each additional child.
