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100 IOWA FARMERS DEAL ROUGHLY WITH JUDGE AT LEWARS

begun roughly handled.
When he persisted in refusing to give the oath, the farmers, most of whom were masked, loaded the blindfolded judge into a truck, climbed to the back seat and carried him away. At a cross roads about one mile southeast of Le Mars, they put a rope around his neck and pulled and repeated their demands. The judge still refused and one of the farmers turned on the torch rope.

Refuse to Comply
Judge Bradley fell only partly conscious but still returned to comply with the demands, the witness said. The farmers dragged the judge to his feet, carried him to the side of the road and threw the loose end of the rope around his neck.
"Make him get down on his knees and pray," one of the farmers shouted.
The judge was pulled to his knees and declared:
"I will do the fasting to all men and to the best of my knowledge."

One of the farmers proposed a hibiscus tree to be planted in the judge's head. The oil and grease ran down his face as the farmers threw him back to the oil.
The farmers removed the judge's trousers and filled them with dirt, then drove off, leaving the bedstuffed jurist standing in the middle of the road. Several other farmers were with him, but they refused.
His neck was chafed and his lips were bloody, in addition to the dirt and grease on his face and hair.
He was taken back to town in a car by Wilbur de Pre, son of the Rev. J. de Pre, acting as the court house, he was to be left alone.
"Let rather not be repaid in answer to queries as to whether he would seek prosecution of his abductors."

Sherriff R. E. Rippey appeared on the scene shortly after the judge returned to his chambers.
The judge had set today as the date for hearing on the first of several cases brought by the farmers to test the validity of new Iowa statutes postponing mortgage sales.
Earlier in the day, farmers participated in the same persons who participated in the abduction were held in the jail. Sheriff Rippey said he will return to the O'Brien county courthouse but the efforts of the deputies held them to the two lower floors while the jail was completed. The farm, 160 acres near Calumet, Iowa, brought \$5000.

"He had the best kind of reputation in Phoenix," Crowley said. "I almost seemed a pity to bring him back to prison but there was no other course. Five separate legal actions were brought by his neighbors to prevent his being returned."

Sentenced in 1928
Tharp, who was sentenced in November, 1928, to life imprisonment for the murder of Mrs. Lois May Bowen, 27, Twin Falls, during an airway growing out of a prolonged neighborhood quarrel, lived in Phoenix under the name of Ward Grove.
He said he "walked off" the prison farm at Meridian on the night of September 20, 1932, and hid at a garage at the extradition hearing in Phoenix. The governor, Crowley said, they were prepared to prove Tharp was released by the warden.

Tharp told officers after his capture that he made his way by hitchhiking to Portland and then down the coast to southern California, taking almost a year in the process. He met his wife, he said, quite by accident. He went to call on his daughter in Phoenix and there found his wife and two sons. Together they set up a small grocery business. Later the younger of the two boys was killed in an automobile accident but the older boy and Mrs. Tharp are continuing to operate the grocery.

He was brought back by airplane from Phoenix, although part of the trip was made by automobile when fog forced the passenger plane down between Phoenix and Los Angeles.

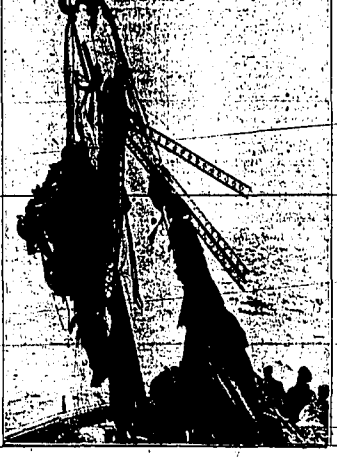

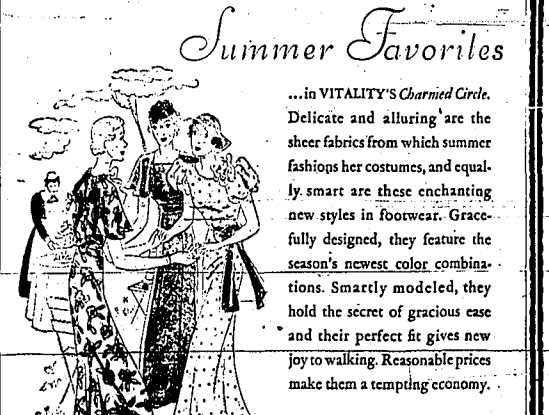

COUNCIL FOREGOES MILK RULE DECISION

Fate of Grading Ordinance Depends upon Incoming Municipal Officials

Twin Falls city council, with three of its five members retiring, last Tuesday's election will leave to the newly elected members taking office next Monday evening, the decision whether a new milk ordinance which the council adopted last March 20 is to be made effective.

The new ordinance which Dr. J. T. Reed, meat and dairy inspector, worked out in collaboration with the state welfare department county health unit and city attorney, provides for grading of milk and milk products on a basis of inspections and tests conforming to or more factors, all tending to assure the consumer a safe supply. It would supersede existing measures applying to regulations which admittedly are not entirely effective.

The ordinance, according to intention of the council, announced when it was adopted, was to have been made effective May 1. The ordinance, however, could not be put into operation until its publication and publication was delayed pending the outcome of last Tuesday's election.

Councilmen making last evening to canvass the election returns, agreed that the incoming members should say whether the new milk ordinance is to be made effective.

The official canvass was in accordance with unofficial computations previously announced, showing a 47-vote majority for the Republican candidate over R. E. Bobier, incumbent. Re-election for a third term was effective only of 354 total votes cast. Newly elected councilman was C. H. Coleman, who received 224, and A. O. Johnston, who received 188 votes at Tuesday's election.

Re-election members who have two-year terms yet to serve are L. A. Oslip and J. E. White.

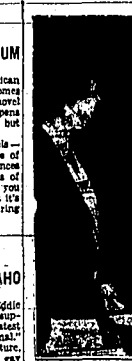
