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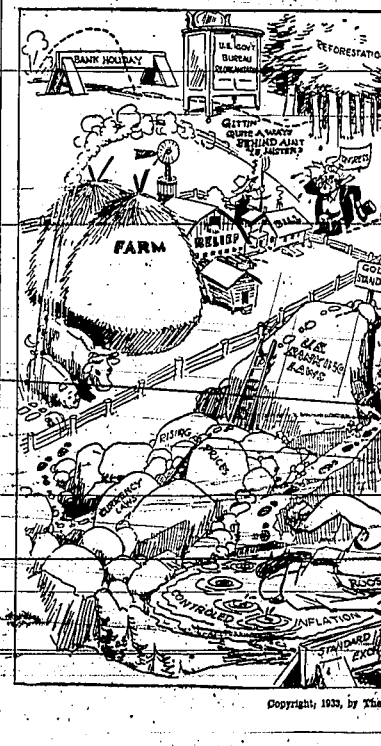

boria, stipulated, voted for the Thomas amendment, which Democrats were in favor of. On final passage of the farm bill, with inflation included, only four Democrats were in favor, and the three who opposed inflation, six Democrats, five Republicans and eight Democrats, all Republicans, and eight Democrats, all Republicans, voted against it.

A committee composed of E. T. Peck, Blackfoot, and A. Humphrey, American Falls, was chosen to draft resolutions which resolutions are to be submitted for approval by each group represented at this evening session. The resolutions which it was indicated will approve the proposed new development provided certain assurances are given against possible disturbance of existing water rights.

# OGDEN E. MILLS CRITICIZES ACT OF LEGISLATURE

### Indiana-Republican Editorial Association Hears Former Secretary Assail Program Administration Sponsored

INDIANAPOLIS, April 28 (AP)—Ogden E. Mills, former secretary of the treasury, in a speech tonight before the Indiana Republican editorial association assailed an uncoordinated, haphazard administration's inflation, farm relief and labor measures but said if we are to solve these problems it is the duty of all to contribute as best each may to their success.

"All measures," he said, "proposed by the administration that will promote the common welfare are entitled to our support. It is in the interest of sound legislation the opposition should subject every bill to the tests of analysis and to the tests of the people."

World War Objections—Mills said that the main purpose of the bill was constructive, and recognizing that the administration has a right to make a mistake, he would resolve doubtful questions in its favor and be willing to subordinate his own judgment to the will of the present conditions. I recognize the force of the argument in favor of experiment.

"But we cannot be expected to accede our deepest convictions and principles. When measures go so far as to be subversive to the principles upon which our government is founded, then the country is not to be ruled by its institutions, then we must speak out."

Analysis—Mills said that the labor control measures advocated by Secretary Perkins for incorporation in the 30-hour work week bill, might said:

"Under the terms of these two bills the executive branch of the United States government is not only to take over the taxing power, but is to have the right to fix prices of some of the necessities of life, to control the production of basic commodities, to license business, to regulate the hours of work, to establish the wage scales and to fix the production of every individual industrial establishment in the country."

"If there exists such power in the federal government, fear up your histories and your constitutions. A government of such power which has become overnight one of unlimited authority over the lives of its citizens, such a limit on its responsibility will cease to exist. The federal form of government, with local control, is the only successful form of government for this immense country, will be destroyed."

On the inflation legislation he said it will authorize the president not only to fix the prices of commodities affecting the rights and property of millions of individuals, but to regulate the production of the necessities of government of the United States."

He added: "Bonds and notes that, in accordance with specific statutory enactment carry on their faces the promise to be paid in gold-dollars of the present market value of the bonds under the terms of this bill will be redeemed in gold dollars of a lower standard of value."

"We are not to do with this under the compulsion of necessity. Our government is not to be run by the force of free choice. You may be told the necessity, I say to you that it does not mean that we are to do with it of any necessity for abandoning the gold standard."

Mills forecasted pessimism, willingness to endorse the first section of the inflation act, providing for purchase of three billions of new bonds by the federal reserve banks, though he said he doubted the need to buy so many.

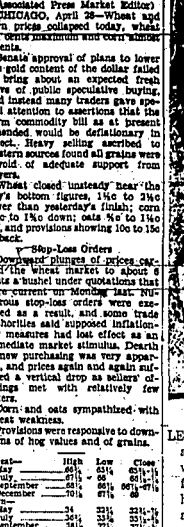

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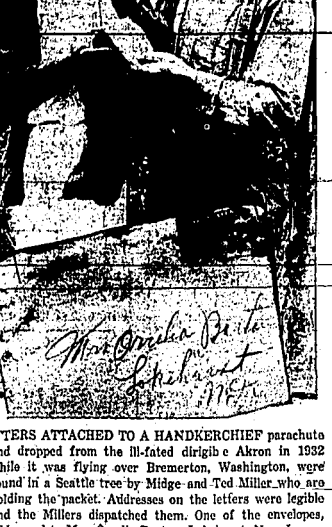
