They held and were confined to the Mississippi and Arkansas deltas. Eight were killed—seven in Mississippi and one in Arkansas. Just Monday the winds resumed their attack and jumped about from Illinois, where at least 80 were killed, to Morrison, Illinois. From Chicago, 483 killed of the storm.

The first report of Monday's tornado came from the Missouri line where the wind killed two persons at Galien and one at Camp, Arkansas. There was property damage on the border was heavy and more than 12 persons were injured.

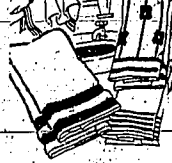

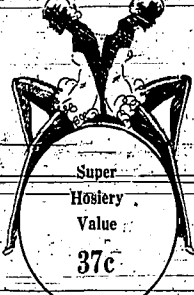

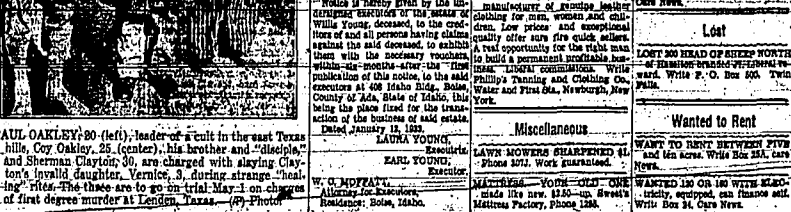
