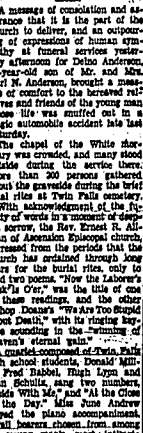

Final Steps for Enactment of Farm Measure

NEW YORK, May 10 (Special to The News)—The Senate today passed the farm bill.
