### FREIGHT CUT AIDS TWIN FALLS AREA

#### Union Pacific Reduces Rates On Outgoing Beans and on Incoming Commodities

The Union Pacific railroad yesterday reduced freight rates on nearly all commodities moving in large quantities but less than carloads. The rates on outgoing beans and on incoming commodities are affected by the new rates. The rates on beans are lowered 10 cents a hundred pounds. Announcement of the new rates was made here by Frank E. Hasechek, Union Pacific agent. The new rates are in line with announcements of lowered rates previously received by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Reduction in commodity rates on merchandise billed to southern Idaho points and originating to Seattle, Portland, Tacoma and Spokane is a hundred pounds. The rates on some commodities have been cut more than this and on others less. No all commodities are affected by the reduction. The rates on goods from the northwest into all southern Idaho. The lower rates on beans went into effect Wednesday. It amounts to a reduction of 10 cents a hundred pounds on beans shipped from the Twin Falls section to all points east of Denver, and to and including Memphis, Chicago and intermediate points.

### PEIPING LIVES IN FEAR OF ATTACKS BY JAPAN'S PLANES

dressed to "Poling Atlanta" and leaving that "Poling and the Atlanta" where they were to be taken to the United States. The Chinese continued their defense of North China.

Foreign military observers linked the raid with renewed Japanese attacks at Hankow, in the North China triangle where Japanese and Chinese have been engaged in bitter battles for weeks.

Foreign communists in the treaty-occupied treaty areas were not alarmed by the episode and were pursuing their usual activities. It is said that this was the first raid since the cities and emphasized to the Chinese population that the Japanese offensive was "nothing more than getting control of several treaty cities."

Diplomats stationed here said no protests against today's flight were contemplated since the Ministry of Foreign Affairs had stated that the plans must first be proved. A Chinese communiqué, meanwhile, said Chinese losses to the engagement at Hankow totaled 600 killed and wounded and 1,000 captured. The communiqué also said that the Japanese were using to conquer other provinces and the territory around the great Chinese wall.

to attack Peiping and Tientsin unless the Japanese had Manchukuo and their officials. Japanese flyers also were reported to have bombed Shih-Hai and Chih-shan, 40 miles east of here, today. Yesterday they attacked Miyun, only 35 miles to the north.

Chinese authorities said their forces were battling heavy damage to the Japanese lines and the invaders had lost 300 killed in the attack, while the Chinese seized 20 prisoners and a quantity of war material.

General Ho Cho-Jui, Chinese commander in the Lower river sector, left here today for Lanchow, saying, before his departure, that "the Japanese are determined to occupy Lanchow and we are equally resolved to resist to death."

He added the Japanese are preparing for further attacks between Kowloon, which controls the route to Peiping, and the sea. The Japanese have said they were the area designated as a neutral zone. A Chinese war bulletin said that the Japanese are being sent to the front on the Peiping-Hankow railway.

Reports regarding the progress of the conflict in North China were conflicting, but it was believed the heavy onslaught launched by the Japanese against Hankow, which is south of Kowloon, was almost ultimate at Miyun.

Japanese air bombers and artillery pounded the Chinese positions today, it was reported, and the Japanese infantry was attempting to establish both the right and left flanks of the defenders at Hankow.

Warriors warned the Chinese to cease opposing the Japanese, to break away from Marshal Chiang, the virtual dictator of the Chinese, and to support the National Government at Nanking, or otherwise the tragedy of Kowloon is greatly multiplied. The Japanese with a great loss of life to both sides will occur in Peiping and Tientsin.

General Ho Ting-ching, national government minister of war, said the Chinese high-command in North China would ignore Japanese threats.

Preliminary Listings for  
Forest Army Bring Drives  
Of Men to Relief Agency

Young men and older men, applicants for emergency construction work, stood in line at Twin Falls Associated Charities headquarters yesterday while E. J. Finch, chairman of the organization, recorded their names and qualifications and other information required for preliminary applications memorandums which had just been made available through the state relief organization.

The scene recalled memories of the World war period when Mr. Finch, as county auditor and secretary of the army selective service board in Twin Falls county, had much to do with the records of men registered in the draft and subject to call into the military service.

The purpose of the preliminary applications, according to available advice, is to secure information that will be of assistance in the final selection of workers for the government's "forest army." The final selection cannot be made until quotas are assigned to counties, and this has not yet been done.

In the case of applicants for emergency employment as supervisors in the "forest army," attention of 200 Idaho men is to be made by representatives of the forest service who, with the information given in these preliminary applications, will be able more intelligently to pass upon the men to be enrolled.

Each applicant indicates his agreement to allow 25 of his 500 30-month cash advance to dependent relatives, and also to abide faithfully by the rules and




