HERR ADOLF HITLER DEFENDS GERMAN'S FOREIGN PRINCIPLES

Chancellor, Using Reichstag As Sounding Board, Plans To Clarify Government's Ideas on Major Matters

BERLIN, May 13.—Adolf Hitler, using the Reichstag as a sounding board, will defend Germany's foreign policy in an address Wednesday and lay the blame for Germany's present situation on the League of Nations.

Hitler's political isolation into which Germany has drifted, the Nazi chancelor, will make a bold effort to clear the country's position in a speech which his followers say will be one of his supreme efforts.

A vigorous protest against the failure of other countries to disarm in the League of Nations conference, Hitler is expected to make.

GERMAN ORGANIZATIONS

Hitler will also defend Germany's uniformed organizations, such as the brown-shirted "Hitler Youth" and the "Hitler Women," against efforts to raise them as part of the League of Nations.

The chancellor will attempt to clarify the government's position.

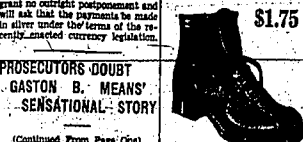

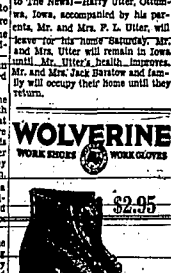

Total 1932 Operation Cost Of Twin Falls System Less Than Half of 1928 Peak

Twin Falls canal company, operating 30,000 acres, reduced its 1932 expense to \$177,000, which is only 50 per cent of the \$350,000 which was the peak expenditure, according to a comparative statement which is being made available to the public.

With an annual maintenance assessment of \$1 per acre, the canal company operated during 1932 with its smallest revenue for any year of the eight-year period which is a conservative statement, but showed at the close of the year a \$400,000 profit. This was due to the fact that the company had increased receipts and expenditures.

The financial position of the company is reported to be the best in its history. It had no liabilities outstanding, and cash on hand amounted to the equivalent of a million dollars. The company has also increased its water supply by a heavy program of reforestation, and drainage and sewage disposal.

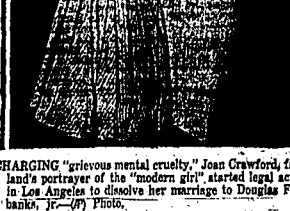

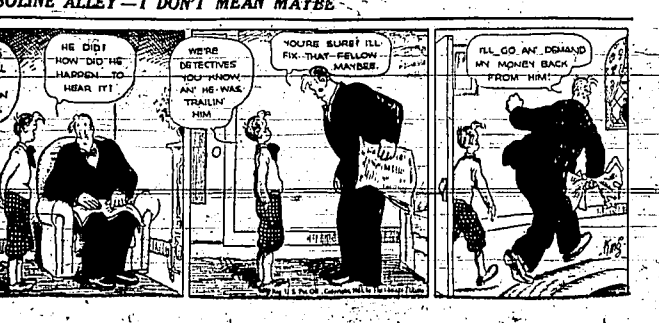
