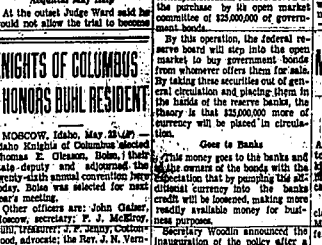

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FOREST CAMP MEN
FILL FIRST PAPERS

Twin Falls Relief Officers
Anticipate Quick Action
After Enrollment Call

Less than half the 115 men to be enrolled from Twin Falls county in forest cooperation work camp called at the Fairbank hall here yesterday and last night to fill out their application memorandums. Those who did not call yesterday are expected to do so today. The office will be open until 6 o'clock tonight.

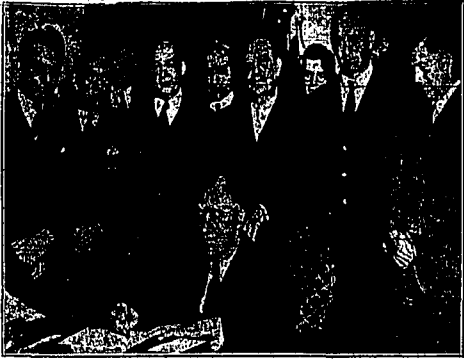
E. J. Finch, relief organization chairman, said last night that the call for enrollment may come at any time, and that indications are the call will come quick action when it does come. Some Idaho counties have been asked to enroll their men in 24 hours, he has been informed.

The memorandums now being filled out give necessary information such as the applicant's name, address and the names and addresses of the dependents to whom he will assign a share of the proceeds. Some applicants may go back to the Fairbank hall to obtain a duplicate of the memorandum now being filled out, and take it to the designated enrollment office. It is anticipated that the Twin Falls men will be examined and enrolled here by the relief officers who are detailed to Twin Falls so that no time will be lost.

Enrollment Explained
Local officials have not been informed just that disposed of the first batch of Twin Falls county men. It is understood, however, that the younger group, those between 20 and 25 years old, from all of Idaho, totaling 1000, will be kept in themselves and grouped in five camps. It is believed the camp near Kelchum will be one of these five. The 75 older men from this county, who will be part of the 2000 in this group from Idaho, will be spread throughout all the camps in areas of 15 or 20 men, it is understood here.

When the call for enrollment comes and the recruiting place has been designated, those selected will be expected to go to the recruiting place prepared to go direct to camp. After the applicant has been accepted by the army all expenses, including transportation, housing, board, clothing and medical care will be taken by the government. An allowance is made by the government for the expense of going to the recruiting station. The applicant should bring a lunch as he is expected to purchase his meals the day he reports at the recruiting station all day. In case of rejection on account of the medical examination he will pay his own expense to his home. If he is brought to the recruiting station by his family or friends they should stand by until he has been finally accepted. Mr. Finch said:

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COURT DISMISSES SUIT
AGAINST CANAL OWNERS

Trial in the suit of the Henry, Henry, for \$25,000 damage done by the Twin Falls Canal company, which had been in progress since the district court here for six days, came to an abrupt close early yesterday when District Judge Adam H. Barclay, following a peremptory decision, announced his decision to grant the canal company's motion for non-suit, which denied the estate's claim, and the jury was discharged from further consideration of the case.

Explaining the decision, Judge Barclay said that evidence on an occasion that Henry owned the canal company to waste water from the canal system, granted 80 acres of the 125-acre tract involved in the suit, was an important factor in the decision. There was question, too, Judge Barclay said, as to whether the estate's claim was a tort claim, and if so, whether it was a claim for damages done to the measure of damages claimed.

The estate's administrator in this suit sought damages for alleged destruction of the value of lands on the foot of Crook creek canyon, south and west of Kimberly, which Henry Gunn, pioneer Idaho ranchman, acquired in 1864, four years before the building of the Twin Falls canal system.

Originally, \$14,640 gross damages was sought, but was reduced to \$25,000 net damages for alleged damage to the land, but the claim for gross damages was dismissed by the administrator's attorney during the trial.

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PRODUCE COMPANY SUES
FOR \$1,000 FIRE LOSS

A motor truck fire that caused delay and loss in delivery of a cargo of poultry and eggs from Twin Falls to Los Angeles last May 20, is the basis of a lawsuit filed in the suit of the Western Poultry and Produce company, Twin Falls, for \$1000 from the Northwestern Fire Insurance company, Seattle, which went to trial before a jury in the district court here yesterday. Claiming an actual loss of \$1000, the Twin Falls concern is suing for the full amount of the \$1000 fire insurance policy which it is alleged covered the loss caused by self-ignition and internal explosion of a motor truck.

J. C. Wyland, one of the owners of the Twin Falls concern, was the only witness called to the stand during yesterday's proceedings. He testified that 70 boxes of dressed poultry in the shipment were lost, and that the value of 12 cases of eggs diminished to the extent of four cents a dozen by reason of the delay caused by the fire.

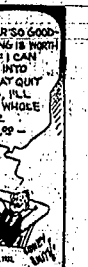
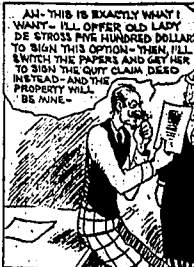
