"I Think We Are Ready Now," Declares Secretary Of Agriculture, "To Reach Out Toward A New Order. We Have Determined To Become Masters—Not Victims"

WASHINGTON, May 25.—The American farmer stands on the threshold of "an experiment in social justice," Secretary Wallace declared in a nationwide broadcast today.

"I think we are ready now," the secretary declared, "to reach out toward a new order. We have determined to become masters— not victims."

1. Provide for reduction in acreage or production of any commodity.

2. Enter marketing agreements with processors, marketing agencies and processors of farm products.

3. License processors and distributors of commodities to regulate handling of agricultural products and eliminate unfair practices and charges.

4. Give the cotton farmer an option at the current market price of the commodity.

5. Amend a processor's tax on commodities served, the tax not to be greater than necessary to cover the cost of the commodity.

6. Substitute private for the public ownership of commodities.

7. With the exception of the cotton option plan no part of the farm act machinery is mandatory. It alone is expected to become effective immediately.

Before definite regulations can be drafted for any of the other plans all parties interested in the production, processing and distribution of the commodity to be served must be represented at a public hearing.

Choice of Plans
It is the first business of the act to give them a choice of control methods, and not that of the market.

Huge annual surpluses, making for low prices, have been a major factor in placing the American farmer in his present position. One purpose of the new farm law is to grant the department of agriculture power to try to cut these surpluses by various means, one of them by having the farmer reduce his production and compensating him by a tax levied on the processor, the man who converts the raw material into products for consumption. The department is not required to use this power, however, and cotton carryovers during recent years are charted above, the 1933 wheat figure being an estimate. George N. 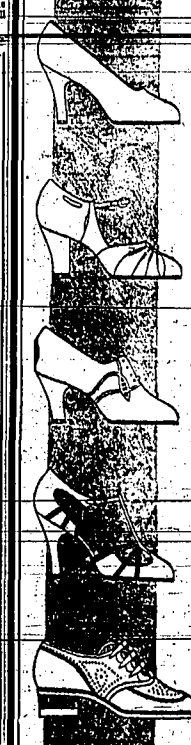

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FAMOUS CIVIL WAR VETERAN SUCCUMBS

LOS ANGELES, May 25 (AP)—The active and colorful career of Major Samuel H. Myers, post, statesman, civil war veteran and author of the military novel "The March to the Sea," has come to an end. He died of pneumonia at the age of 64 last evening at his home in Los Angeles.

Major Myers, a native of Philadelphia, was the last surviving member of General Sherman's staff. His famous general selected him to carry dispatches to General Grant, then at Richmond, from Cape Fear river, and he also carried messages from Sherman to President Lincoln.

It was after his capture and imprisonment in Columbia, South Carolina, that Myers wrote the words to the marching song that became the battle cry of the Union forces. A copy of this song was smuggled through the Confederates' lines and set to music by J. C. Rockwell. It was used until after his release from prison.

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IDAHO COURT RULES IN SCHOOL QUESTION

BOISE, May 23 (AP) - Independent school districts Number 2 in Power county today were denied by the supreme court a share in the school money in the same county.

The case was based on the contention several children residing in the common school districts were attending high school in the independent district and therefore the common school district should be paying their tuition.

A writ of mandamus was sought in district court to compel Viola B. Butler, county superintendent, to transfer the funds to the independent district but the district court declined to issue and the supreme court affirmed the action.

The court found that the children upon whom the May and Bicknell families had attended school all their lives in the independent district and spent only part of their lives on the farm in the common school district. 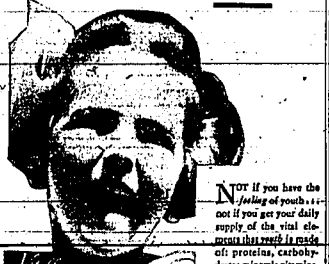

CANAL COMPANY COUNTER-ATTACKS

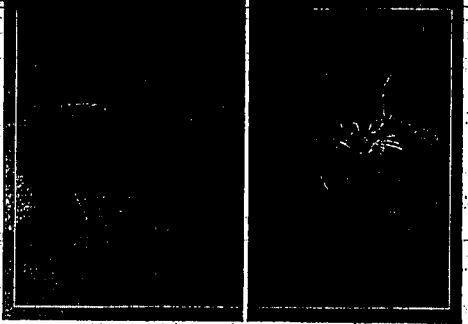

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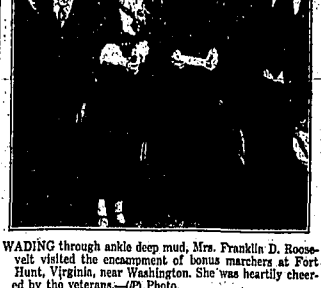

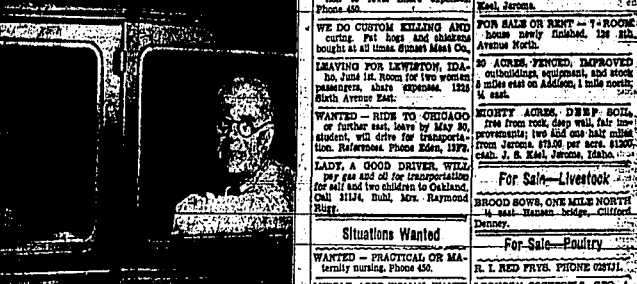
