Morgan's Profits Run Into Untold Millions Investigation Reveals

Documents Throw Light on Past of Noted Financier

Bare Details of Stock-Pool Or Syndicate Operations Hint at Tribute Paid By Securities Buyers

WASHINGTON, May 27.—Profits of untold millions from the stock market through syndicate operations were disclosed today by documents obtained from the home of one of the banking houses by a secret investigator.

The documents from the firm reported to the investigators gross profits of \$1,324,000 from the sale of securities since the beginning of the year period from 1927 to 1931, inclusive, in addition to untold millions of dollars in the form of interest on the loans which it reported.

Go Back to Figures Committee Investigators have gone back to the figures presented by Morgan and found additional profits which were not reported and admitted later to the inquiry committee.

A joint account in Princeton and New York, which was opened in the first half of 1929, to June, 1930, in which Morgan's profits were \$1,324,000, was disclosed by the documents.

The period covered by the figures included two and a half "boom" years and a "panic" year.

Investigation of the accounts of the firm put total income taxes of \$1,324,000 in the hands of the firm since 1929, but the profits revealed today were not divided into years.

Interesting Document One of the most interesting documents in the collection was the operations of the so-called bankers' pool which went into the market in 1929.

Michigan, Rhode Island and Wisconsin already have formally placed their state vote on record for repeal. New Jersey and New York have indicated their support for repeal victories at the polls.

SENATE APPROVES BILL TO RESTORE NATIONAL CARRIERS

Administration Plan Grants Federal Coordinator Broad Powers to Work Out Economies in Operations

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 27.—The administration bill granting broad powers to a federal coordinator to work out economies in railroad operations was passed by the senate today.

The bill will encounter opposition because of amendments to prohibit dismissal of employees in effecting economies.

A similar measure before the house committee was reported to be expected to be reported next week, but Democratic leaders at that end of the capitol said it would not pass.

House leaders indicated strongly the bill would fail if those clauses were included.

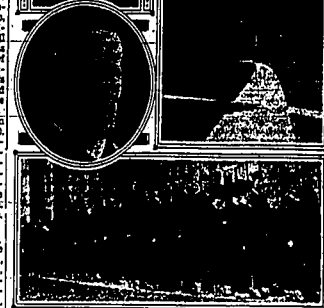

JUDGE'S ASSISTANTS RECEIVE SENTENCES Six Defendants Draw One-Year Suspended Terms For Parts In Abduction

LEWIS, Iowa, May 27 (AP)—Six men were given one-year suspended sentences and three of them received additional terms in the county jail today for their parts in the abduction and threatened hanging of Judge O. Bradley, 59, on April 27. Judge Bradley was dragged from his bench by farmers and threatened with hanging unless he swore to end the constitutionality of the new mortgage moratorium laws in cases pending before him. Lewis, 23, was sentenced to six months in the Plymouth county jail, in addition to the suspended term for his part in the abduction. The other five men were sentenced to one year in the county penitentiary. John Sokolowski, 19, was sentenced to 30 days in county jail. He received also a one year suspended sentence for assault, as did Lawrence Thomas, 21, and William Egan, 23. Albert Kater, 45, and Walter Bieker, 35, were sentenced to 30 days in county jail.

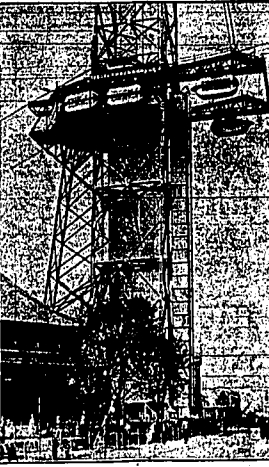
