Agriculture Department Answers Questions of Interest to Idahoans Since Passage of Emergency Act

College at University at Moscow Receives Statements From Federal Government, Explaining Processing Tax, Distribution Costs, Effect on City Man And Purpose of New Legislation to Aid Farmer

MOSCOW, June 1 (Special to The News)—Some of the questions asked since the passage of the emergency agricultural adjustment act are answered in a set of questions and answers received by the University of Idaho college of agriculture from the federal department of agriculture.

Idahoans are interested in the act because three major Idaho farm commodities, wheat, dairy products and sugar, are among the basic commodities of the measure.

Following are presented the answers given by the United States department of agriculture to some of the questions most commonly asked concerning the working of the new act.

Question: Today we have seen in the midst of plenty, what answer does the farm act make to that? Answer: When the farmer has not the income to buy products, the city worker loses his job and cannot buy farm products. By creating conditions which will help the city worker lose his job and buy from the city, one step will have been taken toward going away with the farmer.

Question: How do you reconcile this reduction of production with the city worker loses his job and cannot buy farm products? Answer: We have urged farmers to produce more to the farm, and have urged them as individuals to reduce their price. The present bill faces the fact that the individual farmer cannot adjust his production intelligently unless he knows that his neighbors will do likewise.

Question: Why do you call it "processing tax"? Answer: Because it is based on the volume of wheat processed (manufactured) into flour, or bales of cotton spun, etc. It proceeds into the hands of the processor.

Question: What does "first processing" mean in connection with wheat, corn, oats, and tobacco? Answer: That means milling wheat, slaughtering hogs, or spinning cotton. Oats and peanuts are not in the act. For milk and tobacco, it has to be determined separately for each product.

Question: How much do you intend to cut down production of wheat, pork and cotton this year? Answer: We cannot tell until after public conferences and hearings are held. Calling these conferences will be the first step in the operation.

Question: When will you issue the first order to farmers to cut down their wheat? Answer: We won't order farmers to cut down acreage. If we decide on that, the government will order those farmers to cut down acreage.

Question: How many farmers will be helped by the plan? Answer: When action on wheat, cotton, and hogs becomes effective, perhaps two thirds to three quarters of all farmers will profit from greater prices.

Question: How will you finance the trade agreement? Answer: The price of all farm products should be a rise in the price of basic products.
