COUNCIL MOVES TO SPEED UP VOTE ON "DRY" LAW REPEAL

Resolution Adopted by Unanimous Vote Requests Governor to Set Date for Constitutional Convention

Twin Falls city council voted unanimously last night to adopt a resolution introduced by Mayor Duran Johnson, requesting Governor C. Ben Ross to forthwith by proclamation fix the date for convention in Idaho to vote on repeal of the 18th amendment.
