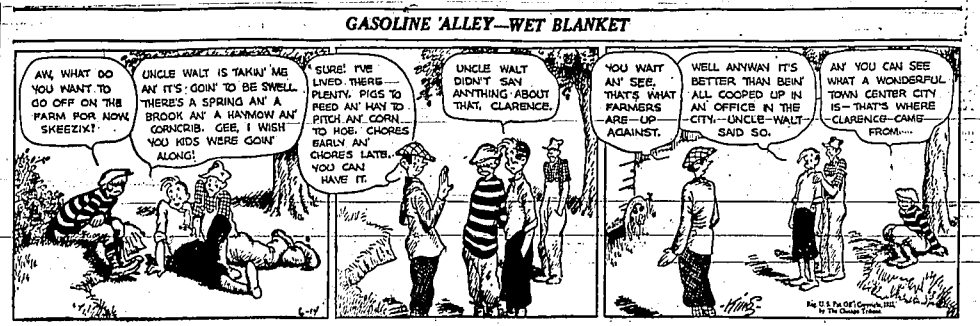

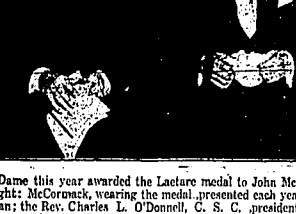

**FACTORY CLOSING PRISON PROBLEM**

**Warden Rudd on Official Visit Here, Sees Serious Situation in Idness**

Idaho's state prison faces a serious problem after the first part of the year when, in compliance with federal and state laws, the prison authorities must discontinue commercial production. George F. Rudd, prison warden since last January, said while here yesterday on his first official visit to Twin Falls.

The state prison population, the warden said, has declined 200 from a peak of around 600 some two years ago. "The shirt factory operations, which were started last year, though men available to keep the plant running," he said, "are hardly enough to take care of the inmates during the first of the year when the shirt factory ceases operations there will be at least 100 inmates without a shirt or a pair of shoes, and that presents a serious problem.

"In most cases," the warden said, "Idaho people retain their place in society and become useful citizens after a year in the prison; if they have been kept there more than a year, but to condemn a man to a year of idleness very probably would lead to less satisfactory results."
