Acceptance by the United States of the gold standard as the basis of the world's monetary system was the greatest encouragement to the intrinsic value of the metal ever announced.

While French delegates tonight praised Mr. Cox's statement, James P. Francis declared that the election of the Ohioan as chairman of the committee on monetary questions and his address as well as that of Neville Chamberlain, British chancellor of the exchequer yesterday, were favorable comments on American quarters and the prospect of important agreements with the French.

This comment was interpreted as signifying France's willingness to participate in a three-power fund to maintain the gold standard and the French franc within an agreed range.

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The content of the dramatic Franco-American impasse climaxed a series of exciting episodes which have the great world convulsions on tenterhooks.

Both last night and at noon today, Chairman Francis and Mr. Bon-saint postponed meetings of his steering committee fearing that controversy would flare up and disrupt the conference.

The core of the American program is the increase of commodity prices, partly through inflationary monetary procedure. The American delegation does not consider the monetary chairmanship vital to its program at the start but was frankly despondent of holding the post and was quickly led to believe by Mr. MacDonald that it had been agreed for an American move.

Conservation of the American delegation grew dimmer, however, when the French insisted that the committee must be headed by a conservative gold standard man and urged Mr. Bon-saint for the job.

The upshot of the squabble was

that Mr. Bon-saint obtained the position as a reporter of the monetary committee, an important assignment inasmuch as he will report findings on the floor of monetary sessions.

The silver-haired "Henry" Gold-Dutch origin minister, ever hot tempered, well-known as economist and journalist as well as statement of the economic committee on the chairmanship of the committee to deal primarily with tariffs.

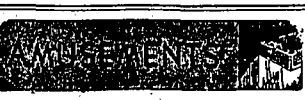

"I don't know what you mean, and I can't bother me half enquiring you go up to London and look at the shops or something?"

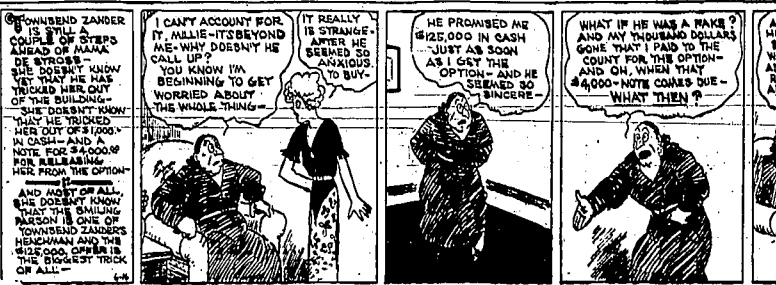

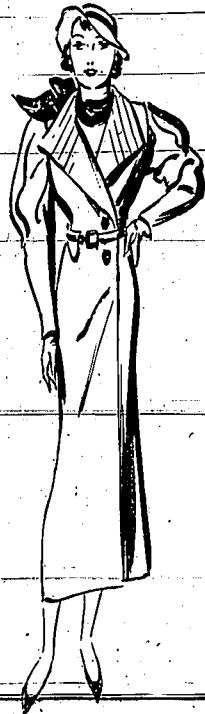

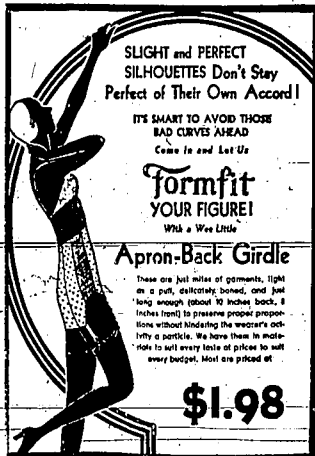
