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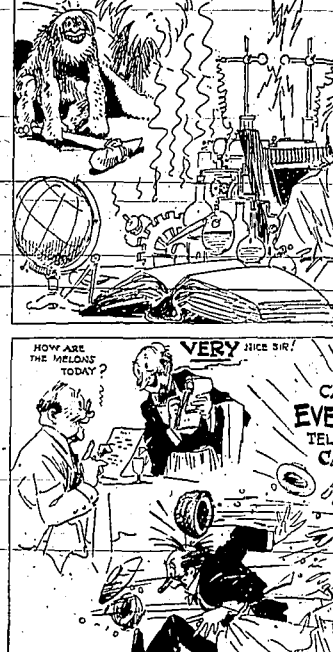

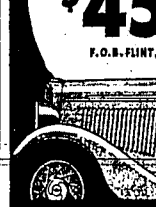

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COAST FIRM BUYS TWIN FALLS APPLE DRYING PROPERTY

Cats American Company Proposes to Modernize and Operate Plant Standing Idle Here for Two Years

Sale of the Pacific Coast Dehydrating company plant, Twin Falls, Idaho for the last two years to the Cats American company, San Francisco, was completed and announced yesterday.

The new owners expect to begin repairs on the plant and installing new machinery by July 13 and begin to be ready to operate about July 20. The plant has approximately 80 people for a hundred day season. Capacity of the modernized plant is 100,000 field boxes of cut apple daily.

The building and plant on Fourth street south between Fourth and Fifth streets was bought outright from the stockholders through Harry E. Adams, of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company, acting for the holding company. The land was leased from the government for 10 years with an option to buy at the end of that period.

Cats American company has been in the exporting business for 71 years. They have offices and headquarters at San Francisco and New York City and have affiliations in Hamburg, Germany, and several other cities. They finance their enterprises.

Frank H. Adams, Twin Falls, for several years purchasing agent for the firm, has been commuting weekly will begin signing contracts with growers for the 1933 cut apple. Mr. Adams said, while first lacking care of those growers who have contracts with the company, he will do all it can to supply or obtain a market for the rest of the crop and the company will be making agent for the company here and in the entire Intermountain section. The firm exports apples, honey, shipping in carloads, and other products of the section if practicable.

I. L. Marsh, Watsonville, California, will move to Twin Falls as resident manager. Naturalization Hearings on Two or Three Petitions Precede Calendar Call

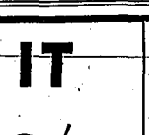
