(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 26—Nearly 200 representatives of the sugar industry converged here today to take part in a session to discuss the possibilities of applying the farm act to sugar production.

In addition to domestic cane and beet producers, many representatives of the industry in Hawaii, the Philippines, Puerto Rico, the West Indies and Cuba were invited to take part in drafting a plan.

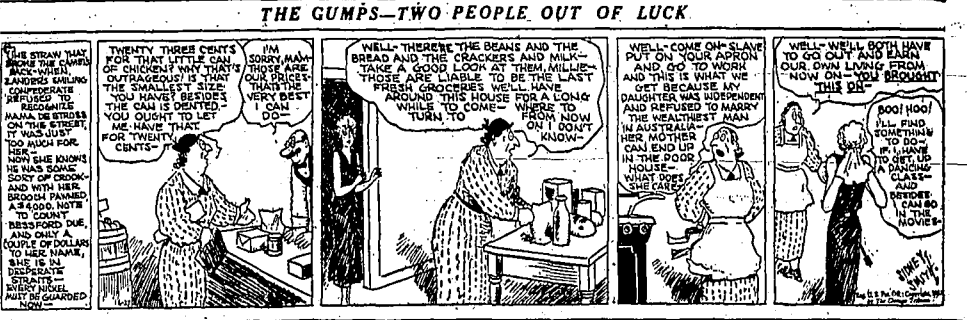
