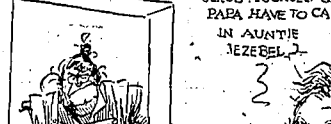

REVEAL GERMAN'S EFFORTS FOR PEACE

Dust-Laden, Secret Diplomatic Correspondence at Washington Shows World War Prolonged 10 Months

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, June 27—Secret diplomatic correspondence of the world during the war was unrolled today with a revelation that the conflict was prolonged for 10 months after Germany and Austria had been crushed.

Decoded messages, dust-laden in boxes filled for a decade and a half, revealed that the German government was not only to be influenced by full participation in the peace process.

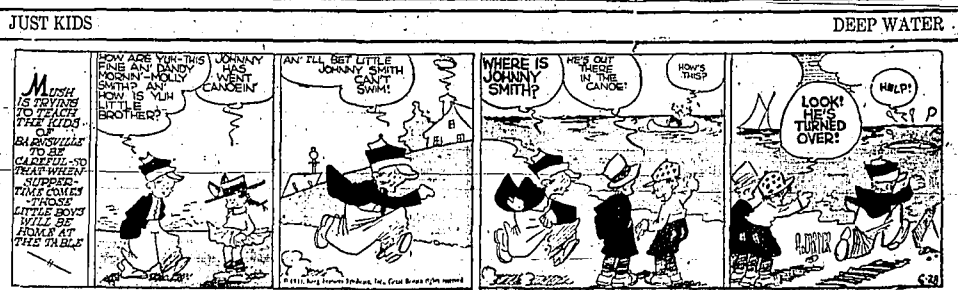

NEW CAMP RISES IN FOREST AREA

Army Officer Leads Progress in Establishment at Porcupine Springs

Since last Thursday, the two hundred and thirty-third company of the civilian corps has made considerable progress in establishing the new camp at Porcupine Springs in the Minidoka national forest, 52 miles southeast of Twin Falls, near Lieutenant H. W. Butler, mess officer for the camp, said here yesterday.

The organization's camp was removed last Thursday to Porcupine Springs from Featherbluff in the Boise national forest, which comprises approximately 700 miles. Transportation of men and equipment—about 200 men and equipment—was completed on the new campsite late in the day. The first night, Lieutenant Butler, mess officer of the organization, broadcasted on the campsite.

Under direction of army officers, 200 enrolled men of the company, including 183 who left their homes in New York and New Jersey earlier last month, are here clearing the brush, set up their army hospital—each accommodation—bunkhouse and mess hall, and are working on the camp's source of water supply, and dammed a stream to improve water facilities. A number of the organization were here yesterday. Lieutenant Butler said that a camp near the mess house, breaking and lifting lava rock for the excelsior plant.

The camp's most urgent requirements now, Lieutenant Butler said, are for refrigeration facilities to preserve the food, and for more vegetables, and for a heating device for bathing facilities.

The lieutenant's mission here yesterday included purchase of an emergency supply of potatoes for the camp.

In explanation of the removal of the camp from Featherbluff to Porcupine Springs, R. H. Huddle, district officer, said in Boise this week:

"This camp was promised to Twin Falls county, and when I finally decided that we would get no more acres I cast around looking for an outfit to send there. This camp could be moved with the least difficulty so I asked Guy Malin about it. He told me he could have the camp to build there, that the road to Atlanta would be built. The promised him a regular forest service crew to build his road."

Because the army would not supply transportation (packing apparatus for the purpose) the people of Twin Falls sent the truck and the transfer was completed over the week-end.

The Minidoka forest, Huddle explained, is extremely important to the people of Twin Falls. "There is more timber used off the Minidoka forest for individual purposes," the forester said, "than almost any of the national forests in the country. The Minidoka forest—have no sales—centers logs but can be used as a center point for fire, as well as other similar uses such as corrals. The idea is to build roads that will open these resources to the general public."

WEEDS FACTOR IN SUIT TO ANNULL LAND DEAL

Edward W. Buckley, Harlan, suing for rescission of the contract under which he agreed in March, 1929, to purchase from Fred E. Barnhart, a 53-acre farm adjoining the town of Harlan—on the south—containing the west side of the city of Harlan, in the district court here yesterday, relating details of the land deal, including alleged concealment that there were noxious weeds on part of the land.

Case witnesses included Mrs. Buckley, R. M. Williams and R. C. Letch, Twin Falls realtors who negotiated the deal, and district clerks, Hannah. The hearing, before District Judge Adam B. Barclay, is to be resumed this morning.

Mr. Barnhart, a pioneer Twin Falls resident, now of Portland, Oregon, California, has been afflicted for four years with paralysis, and is not able to attend the hearing, but his deposition, taken in California last June 2, has been introduced in evidence. It contains a complete denial of charges of misrepresentation regarding noxious weed infestation, in connection with the land deal.

Evidence indicated that Mr. Buckley contributed to the \$14,000 for the property, and that he has paid on account \$200. He said that he first learned of the proposed deal in July, 1929, the property in July last year, and alleges that on account of the infestation the reasonable value of the property is 50 per cent less than the contract price. He asks for rescission of the contract and return of the money he has paid. But was started last March 15.

CAMPS SEND \$100 DAILY TO COUNTY

Forest Project Cuts List Of Unemployed and Lessens Dependents' Needs

The civilian conservation corps forest camps have taken 128 men from the ranks of Twin Falls county's unemployed, and will supply about \$100 a day to their relatives and dependents in this county as long as the camps function and the men work.

If the camps remain open six months as the government planned and the 128 men stay on the job about \$2000 a month or a total of about \$120,000 will be supplied and dependents of the workers in this county from the men's wages. The county will be paid \$23 a month from their \$30 monthly wages. The men are to be paid for their own use. In a very few cases women will get slightly higher salaries.

The last 11 men were called yesterday by J. P. Brown, district clerk, to appear in court. They will leave today. They are: L. McGadam, John E. Casey, Vernon Richard, Fred Underwood, Hollis A. Martin, Alvie D. Knehl, Daniel O. Turnipseed, Jacob Burson, Roy O. Atkinson, Earl V. Auld, and Winston Jones.

The 128 men from this county are assigned as follows: Ten at Ketchum, 24 at Harlan, 75 miles northwest of Challis, and 22 at Challis. The county's quota was 138 men from this county.

Correcting the spray formula in a statement previously signed out by the county, H. H. A. Martin, state department of agriculture horticulturist, yesterday issued this statement:

"The third cover spray should be completed by July 1. The spray should consist of 2 pounds of arsenic of lead and 1 gallon of summer oil to 100 gallons of water applied to the trees at a pressure of at least 30 pounds.

"This spray, which should be very thorough, will be the last leaf arctic spray of the season. The sprays in the future will consist of nicotine and oil. They will be advised at the proper time through the press."
