IDAHO EARLY POTATOES GO TO MARKET FOR \$2.25

BOISE, July 13 (AP)—Prices as high as \$2.25 a hundred pounds are being offered in the Cayuga county early potato market, now beginning at Harvest, R. H. Young, Parma, one of the leading producers, said that the bumper crop has barely started.

"This price is just a 1/2 a hundred more than we received last year," Young said.

"About a half dozen carloads have been shipped, a total harvest of 100,000 to 150,000 carloads more, he said.

He attributed the sharp recent rise in price to the demand suffered by the Middle West crop from heat and drought.

(By The Associated Press) SATTLE, July 13—"Klondike Kate," the dance hall girl who dazzled the Yukon in the gold rush days, is going back to the Far West as a bride.

She smiled wistfully here today as she spoke of the romance that was born in Dawson on Christmas eve, in 1900—the woman who is known throughout the West as the girl who gave Alexander Panigaris his start in the theatrical world.

"Tomorrow, at Vancouver, British Columbia," she said, "I am going to marry John Mason, an Alaskan miner. We're going back to Alaska to live."

Her way was to Vancouver, Klondike Kate later, Kate Rockwell, Bend, Oregon, passed through here today, and left on a night boat for the British Columbia coast.

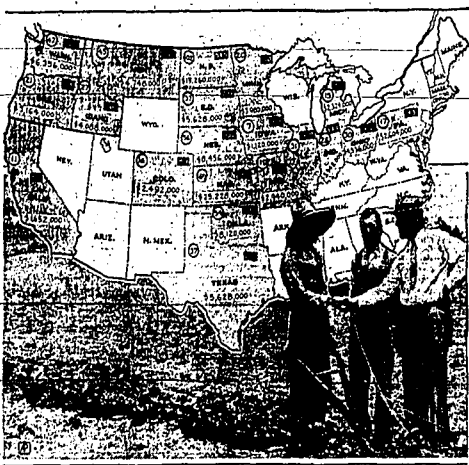

Babson Foresees Sweeping Changes Under Recovery Act

Statistician Regards Revolution In Business World as Comparable To Revolts In Russia and Italy

Administration Falls, Expert Looks For Return To "Rugged Individualism" Or Turn of Nation Directly to Fascism In Footsteps of Great European Powers

BABSON PARS plans to issue a booklet on the recovery act which is a revolution in the history of the United States. Few people realize the far-reaching importance of present day events. To a certain degree, business in the United States is today experiencing a revolution comparable with the Russian economic revolution of 1918 and the Italian economic revolution under Mussolini. The powers granted under the act are far-reaching. Not only can the government dictate the amount of goods which each manufacturer may produce and what price he may charge, but it also takes a long step towards control of labor policy. This is the first time in our history that the federal government has placed its official seal on collective bargaining, minimum wages, and elimination of child labor. Many manufacturers fear that this complete change of policy will allow labor to get the upper hand. Personally, I do not have these fears for three reasons. First, organized labor is so bureaucratic that it will be two years before it can take up and organize to take advantage of the national recovery act. Second, I believe that in the long run labor must prosper if business is to prosper. Third, social laws giving wage-earners a larger percentage of the national product and more efficient production and economy. According to me, I am glad that labor will get some direct benefits from the national recovery act. In the end, anything that is done toward equalizing opportunities and helping the underdog is better for all of us. The question of higher wages brings up the question of higher prices. Higher wages, however, mean higher retail and wholesale prices. General Johnson, administrator of the act, has appealed to manufacturers to raise wages without raising prices until purchasing power is sufficient to absorb the higher retail prices. This means the manufacturer would have to absorb the wage increase. Economic history, however, teaches us clearly that this has never taken place and that increased prices always precede in-

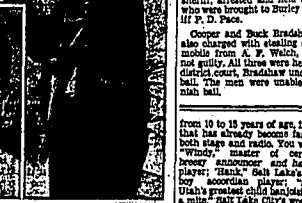
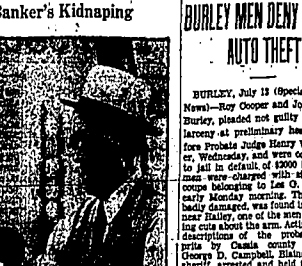

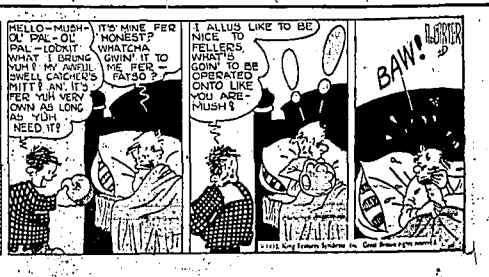
