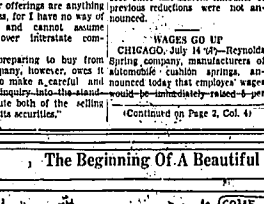

SENATOR POPE URGES EMBARGO ON ARMS

WASHINGTON, July 14 (AP)—Passage of the arms embargo bill from the next session of congress was advocated last night in an address by Senator Pope, Democrat of Idaho. The resolutions as passed by the house last session, would authorize the president, in cooperation with other nations, to prohibit the export of arms and munitions to a country or countries engaged in civil war.

The resolution filed in the senate by Senator Pope, Democrat of California, offered an amendment to provide that any embargo should apply equally to all countries engaged in conflict.

"It is clearly the purpose of this amendment to prevent the president from acting in concert with the other great nation manufacturing nations to determine the embargo action and to apply the embargo to such nations," Senator Pope said. "It is my purpose to see that the senate adopt the resolution as it passed the house."

IDAHO BEET GROWERS SHARE IN \$137,410

OGDEN, Utah, July 14 (AP)—H. A. Branning, general manager of the American Beet Growers' Association, announced today checks totaling \$137,410 will be mailed tomorrow by the company to the growers of Idaho and California, bringing the total paid growers this season to approximately \$2,925,000. The president's study is a response to a proposal by the International Gold Bullion Association, which is a group of gold producers in various countries.

The association's proposal is to create a world-wide market for gold bullion, which would allow producers to sell their gold to the highest bidder, regardless of nationality.

Roosevelt's study will determine if such a market is legally feasible under U.S. law.

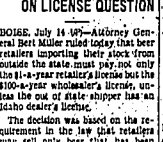
Those charged to youth efforts should be charged to older persons who exploit youth's weaknesses, said Sherwood.

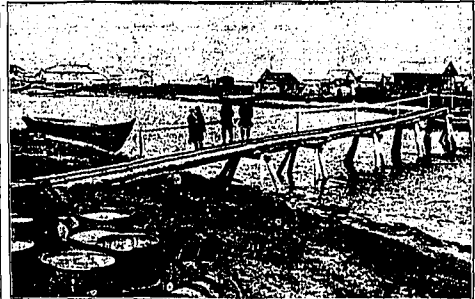
