(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 26.—In the greatest bid-opening in history, the navy department today received offers for construction of 11 new fighting ships at from \$3,000,000 to \$25,000,000 each to bring the fleet to comply with the London treaty limits.

A short final bid opened estimates for one class of war vessels—aircraft carriers, heavy and light cruisers, destroyers and submarines. Immediately, naval engineers went to work on the bids, ready to speedily award the employment in shipyards.

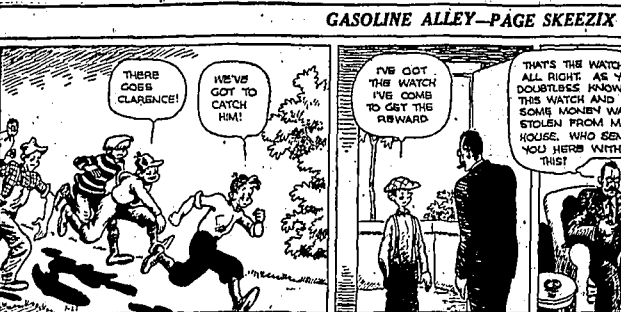

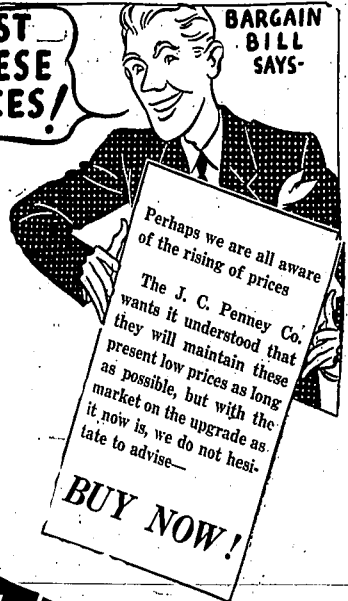
