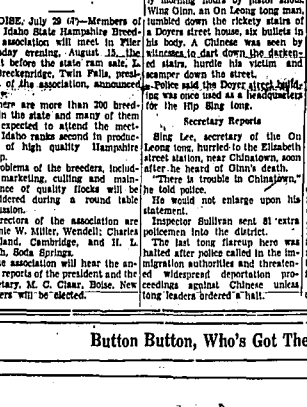

Writer Predicts Passage Of Repeal Amendment by Time New Year Arrives

By JAMES D. WHELAN Results of election held as far in the various states to select delegates to congress to pass on the adoption of the Twenty-first constitutional amendment, offered as a substitute for the Eighteenth amendment, furnish an approval before the beginning of the new year. The American people evidently prefer to vote overwhelmingly in favor of retaining control of liquor to the several states.

Those who still believe in national prohibition, however, properly are voting to retain the Eighteenth amendment in our federal government. However, in the event the voters do not do so, the amendment will be repealed.

It is to be expected that the national prohibitionists of both major parties were pretty much alike and both opposed the repeal of the Eighteenth amendment. It is to be expected that the voters of the American people do not want either national prohibition or saloons. Yet many states have saloons unless those opponents of their return organize to put some better system into effect.

The idea of federal control and operation of the liquor business in such states as do not want prohibition appears to be many thoughtful investigators, but is rendered impractical by the fact that the voters of both major parties to turn the matter over to the several states. The present law is practically private free manufacture and sale in all out-prohibition states and may be ruled out as a failure.

This leaves a State dispensary system the only alternative for licensed saloons of the national prohibitionists as retain state-wide prohibition. This system has its drawbacks, but it is the only one that is possible in the United States.

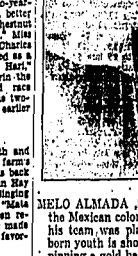

### COUNTY STILL HAS BIG WHEAT CROP AFTER REDUCTION

#### Figures Show Twin Falls Will Produce 1,295,645 Bushels Next Season Under Adjustment Program

Under the new agricultural adjustment administration's wheat crop reduction rules, Twin Falls county will be permitted to produce next year, 1,295,645 bushels of wheat. The five-year average production worked out here yesterday on the basis of information that has been supplied to the office of Twin Falls county agent, who, under the regulations, is to be executive secretary of the Twin Falls county wheat production control association.

Five-year average production of wheat in Twin Falls county, 1,618,325 bushels of wheat. These regulations next year, the five-year average production of wheat in each county is the basis for the compilation. The agreement which wheat growers pledge reduction of wheat acreage in return for a share in the wheat price stabilization fund for reduction of the five-year average by "not more than 30 per cent."

Wheat production the past five years is 1,618,325 bushels. Last year's production in Twin Falls county was over 2,000,000 bushels and the year before it was somewhat over 2,000,000 bushels. Reduction of the 1,618,325-bushel five-year average production by 30 per cent would result in a permissible wheat production in Twin Falls county next year, 1,132,825 bushels. Figures for other counties are arrived at by computing 30 per cent reduction of their five-year average production figures.

Distribution Basis. Farmers also will share in distribution of wheat price tax on the five-year average production basis. They will receive this amount approximating 28 cents per bushel for 64 per cent of their production. Farmers in it to be made to growers for their wheat that goes into human consumption. The agricultural adjustment administration will make that 54 per cent of the total wheat crop goes into human consumption.

### ILLINOIS CORN CROP CONDITION SERIOUS

Crop conditions throughout Central Illinois are about as bad as they have ever been, according to a newspaper clipping received a day or two ago by G. H. Kayler, Twin Falls, with prospects for reverse of encouraging.

Central Illinois' corn crop faces immediate crisis owing to the lack of rain, declares the Baldwin Elevator company weekly letter, adding that conditions already have grown serious and thousands of acres now are in such condition that rain cannot help.

"Another dry week, with only fore-cast of rain showers and cooler, which never materialize.

"Wheat harvest now well along and a few more days will wind up the harvest. Quality excellent, but not all testing 35 to 41 pounds. The average yield for the state is estimated at 40 bushels. Many farmers took advantage of the high wheat, while others stored their crop, expecting to realize a higher price.

"The oats that are being harvested show such a range in test weight and moisture, and Central Illinois is now facing a corn crop failure. Conditions here really become serious in this locality. There are a lot of unacclimated late-season small and medium ears. Of course, moisture even they could not make corn now would help the plant to grow so that some could be cut for feed. There are some signs of early corn that are well advanced, heading, deep color, which are quite a contrast to the late variety. Good general rains are needed to relieve the drought, as well as to help to check damage by insects bugs.

"The corn crop was good. 'We'll May' makes plenty of hay. Clover hay looked as good as any they could hardly hit the stalks late enough to make wintering. First cutting of alfalfa heavy, second crop is good, however, there is a possibility of getting two more cuttings. Pastures brown and burned. Soy beans marking time. All vegetation is dead.

"If it does not rain soon many lo-calities in this area, representing some of Illinois' best black core land, will not produce even feed for their livestock and will be in history at the September election of the Eighteenth amendment.

### Discrepancies in Election Records Trouble Auditor

Twin Falls county auditor and recorder, Frank J. Smith, audited the original registration lists for September 19, listing the names of electors who voted in the November general election.

It was not his thought that there were any discrepancies in the election records, but scanning of the three good many voters registered under one name and voted under another.

For instance, he said, a voter who registered as Mrs. John Smith may have been listed on the election boards poll list as Jane Smith, but his name did not appear on registration books at all.

It was the auditor's idea that special instructions should be issued to election boards hereafter to be particularly careful about recording voters names on poll lists to conform with names as they appeared on registration lists.
