WASHINGTON, Aug. 1.—Administration officials today announced that they have set aside \$100,000,000 for three projects: power, irrigation and transportation.

The \$63,000,000 is for work on the Columbia river undertaking, and the \$22,700,000 is for the Wyoming power project.

The \$14,300,000 is for the transportation project.

The administration officials said that the \$100,000,000 is the largest sum ever set aside for these three projects.

ready in organization and as work to cooperate with state authorities. The income, tax statute and postal regulations also are to be brought into play by the proposed federal government.

**Author of Books**  
Professor Moley, who has made special studies of crime and has written books on the subject, said Mr. Roosevelt did not reveal details of the plans he has in mind.

The aide of Moley, who is assistant secretary of state, revived a fresh outbreak of speculation about the reported differences between him and Secretary Hull over state department policies and the possible resignation of the former.

Asked specifically if he were going to continue in the department until the end of the year, Moley quickly replied "I certainly am. Do you know of any good reason why I should not?"

Newsman referred to published reports that Secretary Hull, who is returning from London, might have for Moley's resignation, Moley replied: "Those are assumptions and I don't reply to assumptions."

**Expected**  
Nevertheless, significance was attached to the sudden Moley visit here on the eve of the arrival of Secretary Hull, who is expected to come here for a full discussion of his work at London upon his return to New York tomorrow or Thursday.

Moley was not only emphatic that he was going to remain as assistant secretary but he declared he had been given no special assignment by the president on kidnapping.

Without doubt, Mr. Roosevelt is going to coast considerably on the enlarged bureau of investigation in the department of justice under J. Edgar Hoover to wage a relentless war on kidnapping and racketeering. He is looking for every available avenue of attack until he can get additional legislation to strengthen the federal power at the session of congress convening in January.

Moley described the national congress act allowing national commission by industries for mutual agreements as "a step in the right direction" in beating down racketeering.

The assistant secretary of state motored here from New York with Mrs. Anne Curtis Dall, who is bringing her two children, "Stella" and "Buzzie" to remain during the hot days with their grandfather and grandmother.

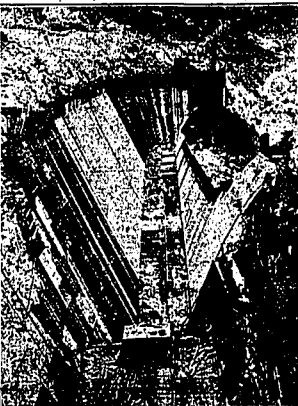
