Individual factory committees would appeal to the state boards if they are unable to get an agreement and the state boards could appeal to the national board.

The new temporary codes applied to banks and other industries today followed similar alterations of the president's agreement in favor of retailers and foodstuff dealers pending final disposition of the codes for these industries.

More than 250,000 workers now employed are affected by the modifications in favor of the electrical, manufacturing, radio, bedding and rayon industries, with 60,000 others expected by the administration to be re-employed.

stors," Kelly said, "and we went in together. He pointed out a man he said had sold him candy and sandwiches. The clerk then said they remembered seeing Edwards with a boy."

"Edwards took us to a man behind the end of the Number 7 car line where he said he and the boy waited after they got off the street car, which they had taken down town," Kelly continued. "There we found a rock which Edwards said he had used to hit the boy on the head. We found a nubbin which Edwards said had been used to wrap sandwiches."

Before a Night

Kelly said Edwards in his statement told of leaving the body on the mesa until midnight when he returned with an automobile and took it to the water front.

"Edwards said," Kelly related, "that he used a butcher knife to mutilate the boy and put the severed parts of the body in a glass jar, weighted with an iron spike, and then threw it into the bay as he had the body."

The body was found in the bay July 24. Navy divers will search the bay tomorrow near the place that Edwards pointed out to police.

Kelly said detectives had obtained a butcher knife, but would not say where it was found. The officer said Edwards stated:

"That is the knife I used," he said to him "I don't seem sharp enough for a right-hand man. I feel disappointed as to how it was used."

Kelly said the story would be checked further. He said the truth comes under the public work program and is intended to give the American fleet the strength it is allowed under existing naval agreements.

### \$2,500,000 IN SILVER ARRIVES AT VICTORIA

### TEXAS BOY WITH BROKEN NECK FIGHTS FOR LIFE

AUSTIN, Texas, Aug. 2 (AP)—Warren Thornton, 16, received a broken neck in a motor truck accident July 1 and for 27 days lay virtually motionless and speechless on a hospital bed. Physicians virtually despaired of his life. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. C. Thornton, maintained a vigil by his bedside, telling the story of his life, and the boy's own operation of his eye, smiling and recognizing his parents, inquired in a whisper: "Will you come and get me?"

Physicians expressed belief he will survive.

### \$743,918 IN FEDERAL AID GOES TO IDAHO IN JULY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (AP)—Distribution of almost \$4,000,000 of federal money for unemployment relief in July in 42 states, three territories and the District of Columbia, was recounted in detail today by the federal relief agency, including:

Arizona, \$18,773; Colorado, \$50,100; Idaho, \$770; Illinois, \$10,227,704; Montana, \$20,414; Nevada, \$47,000; Oregon, \$48,833; Utah, \$179,401; Washington, \$1,191,211.

### IRRIGATION PROJECTS WIN FAVOR AT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2 (Special to The News)—It is believed by Washington officials that irrigation projects will allocate \$20,000,000 to the improvement and construction of reclamation projects, to be distributed by the reclamation service. The money would come from the fund of \$1,500,000,000 set aside for self-liquidating projects out of the public treasury, which is approximately \$2,100,000,000.

The administration did not originally intend any of this fund for irrigation or reclamation projects. It is understood, if a change of intention has occurred, it was brought about by a conference called by Senator James P. Pope, Democrat, Idaho, which was followed by an inquiry by President Roosevelt and Secretary of the Interior James T. A. Walters, assistant secretary of the interior, supplied valuable information.

The president was told that of all money due the government from reclamation projects payments have averaged 80 per cent during the depression years, but he was shown. It is said, that the desired projects will not increase the surplus of farm products on the market.

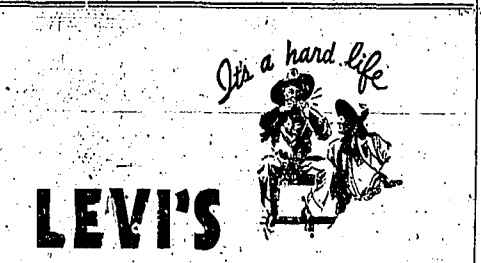

**IDAHO DANKS AGREE TO TERMS OF NRA**

BOISE, Aug. 3 (AP)—Two major groups of banks in Idaho have agreed to abide by NRA pledge for shorter working hours and minimum wage, joining the growing list of organizations subscribing either to the general code outlined by the president or in special codes.

Eggn Dicoil, president of the First Security bank in Boise, said today his bank and all others of the First Security organization had already signed the pledge.

"Of course our present minimum wage are already well above the minimum prescribed by the president," he said. "It means adjustment of the wages of the employees which to meet the restrictions but this can be done readily. It probably will not mean a reduction of any kind, but a mere rush of business in the fall."

Similarly Homer Pitzer, executive vice president of the First National bank of Idaho, said that institution would sign the general code, along with its allied banks in western and central Idaho.

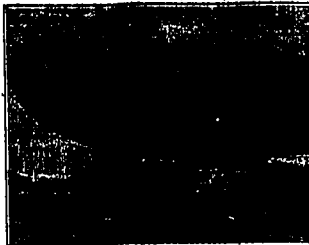

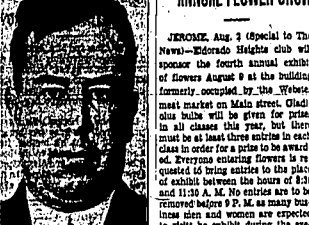
