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NEW STRUCTURES RISE AT JEROME

Work Progresses at Lumber Yards, Baptist Church and Addition to Creamery

JEROME, Aug. 5 (Special to The News)—As far as building is concerned, Jerome is one of the busiest little cities in the state. Carpenters are employed by erecting additions and new structures of business houses and private dwellings.

The Jerome lumber company's yards and buildings are among those being completed. The yard is located at the corner of Avenue and Locust street, facing east on the west side of Locust street. The usual lumber arrangement is employed, the lumber being placed on each side.

The ground is 100 feet by 125 feet. Along the south a lumber shed 100 feet by 22 feet has been built. A smaller shed measuring 60 feet by 22 feet stands from the sidewalk, next to the alley. Dupliss, such as cement, lime, plaster will be kept in a building 25 feet by 25 feet which is adjacent to the latter building. Sand, coal and gravel will be stored in the space to the left. The office building 30 feet by 20 feet is being swiftly completed. It is being well ventilated by means of 12 feet wide openings in the walls which will contain a furnace. This building will be partitioned into two rooms for an office room 10 feet by 10 feet, and a stock room 10 feet by 18 feet, and a stock room 10 feet by 18 feet, door, window and floor.

plays for national welfare. The president described as measures and pursued the unusual course as a medium for the duration of the recovery.

Looking ahead to the future, he made it plain tonight he does not intend a permanent government management of industry.

It will leave it to time and developments to determine the merits of future control and the limits to which it will go. He is going to watch the way business men and their organizations are developing.

The national tribunal of seven members, headed by Senator Wagner, Democrat, New York, and a labor authority, will serve during the critical stage of the recovery drive. It may continue as a central body or eventually there may be established arbitration boards in each industry.

Mr. Roosevelt does not want any conflicts over interpretation of the law. He expects the tribunal to be the nation's fighting its way up to the end of the recovery.

It was made plain here, however, that both General Hugh B. Johnson, director of the War Relocation Authority, and the president want the movement to take place. He feels the great danger is in the industrial government's unwillingness to adjust any difficulties.

The industrial and labor advocates jointly appeal to the Federal Labor Board, Dr. Leo Wolman, former Columbia university professor and chairman of the recovery administration's labor advisory committee; John L. Lewis, president of the Mine Workers' Union; Walter C. Teague, chairman of the administration's industrial advisory board; and George Berry, president of the President's Council on War Relocation.

HOSPITAL PATIENT SUES FOR \$25,000

Miss Marie Henderson Sues County When Commission- ers Postpone Decision

A claim for \$25,000 damages from Twin Falls county on account of alleged neglect of a patient at the county general hospital has been carried into the district court here, following Twin Falls county commission vote last Thursday to postpone action on the claim to their October meeting.

The claimant, Miss Marie Henderson, Hollister, alleges in her complaint that while she was a patient at the hospital, her acid solution, instead of saline solution, was administered to her during an operation on the side and thigh so that it was necessary for her to undergo surgical operations and for her to be confined to the hospital until last June 25. She was admitted to the hospital last April 14, for an operation for appendicitis, and remained in the hospital until last June 25. The claim was drafted and filed by Miss Henderson's attorney, Chapman, and Chapman, Twin Falls.

Railroad Day Anniversary Recalls Coming of Twin Falls First Train

Twenty-eight years ago tomorrow 5000 persons and, what is said to have been most of the files in the world came to Twin Falls. History books for the 5000 persons. They came to see the first train come into Twin Falls over the new tracks of the Oregon Short Line railroad.

It seemed as though all the residents of northern Idaho had come on a holiday to Twin Falls on that day, August 7, 1905, according to reports which have come down. They saw the trains come in two of them, sat barbecue, played baseball, listened to the band and heard speeches from the state's distinguished citizens.

The barbecue was cooked in the then vacant lot across the street from the Perrine hotel, then half completed. The meal was served on planks placed in to round corners by Way's cafe. "All the flies in the world were there," said Mr. Sprague last night. "That is my most vivid recollection of the day."

Mr. Sprague also recalled that the only drinking water came from Rock Creek.

"It was guaranteed to give typhoid fever if an epidemic got sick, though nobody drank it," he added.

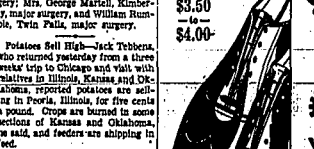

We did not invent the 8-cylinder car. What we did was to make it possible for the average family to own one.

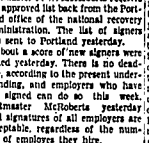
