Four Men Perish In Railway Wreck

SALISBURY, Md., Aug. 12 (AP)—A passenger railroad passenger train "The Cavalier," was wrecked there early today, killing the engineer, the fireman and two "narrow train" riders.

An investigation was launched at once by railroad officials and later by the U. S. Army, trainmaster in charge of the division, announced the wreck had been caused by "a defective springing, with no trails."

The train, which was bound from Cape Charles, Virginia, in New York probably was making 60 miles an hour at the time.

The fatally injured were O. DeCar, Detroit; Delaware; the engineer; E. R. Massey, also of DeCar, Irem, and two Negroes, one of them, Carl Gotten, Millboro, Delaware. Four persons were injured.

DENVER, Aug. 13 (AP)—Terror of an East Denver neighborhood for a few days has been caused by a man who has been seen in the vicinity of a child's home.

The child's mother, attracted by reports of an ape-like creature, took her child to a "wild" cave, where she was reported by other children in the neighborhood.

Awful Experience Ends Life of Youth

WATFORD CITY, N. D., Aug. 13 (AP)—A boy who lay five hours dead in a hospital here today, died after attempting to jump over a deep well.

The child was rescued by the doctor and died as a result of the fall.

Water Chalkover, 18, left his home near here Saturday on a bicycle and was seen to fall into the well at the request of his father, a rancher near here.

The boy was admitted when he did not return, but remaining reports came from Watford City that he had been seen there.

Thursday his sister, Caroline, 12, was sent on the same errand as that of her brother and she found him at the bottom of a well, ten feet deep, badly injured and too weak to be moved.

The boy was partially asphyxiated in mid-air, suffering from lack of air and from the shock of the fall, which was estimated to be high as 35 degrees during the five days.

He was hurried to a hospital at Williston, but died as his relatives carried him up the stairs to the institution.

Skunk Enters House—Family Gets Out

Today the Clarks are living out of doors, while all varieties of skunks are being treated in the home without avail so far.

Idaho Forest Fire Hazards Increase

BOISE, Aug. 12 (AP)—With fire hazards growing steadily worse during the past few days, forest officials in southern Idaho reported rain, recalling that two years ago forest fires in southern Idaho were reported.

A fire was burning in the Idaho national forest, late Wednesday, and it is feared a renewed outbreak of the blaze which started early in the week last.

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Two men fighting the flames were trapped when wings of the blaze overtook them and they perished, and a third man, seeking quarters, to buy themselves in a sand.

FARM AUTHORITIES WORK ON BLANKET CODE FOR MILKMEN

Officials Hope to Increase Returns of Tremendous Branch of American Agriculture Through Action

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—The return of a tremendous branch of American agriculture, the farm adjustment administration is drafting a blanket marketing agreement to apply to the nation's milk distributing industry.

Prepared for ratification by dairy representatives, the proposal is intended to provide relief for milkmen to effect their production contracts, particularly of feed, as a result of the drought in large grain and hay producing areas.

It is an answer of administration to a complaint of dairy interests that the process of carrying out the farm act is proceeding at "too slow a pace."

ROME, Aug. 12 (AP)—The greatest mass oceanic flight in the history of aviation ended tonight with the return of 41 Minnie Winnie balloons from the Atlantic.

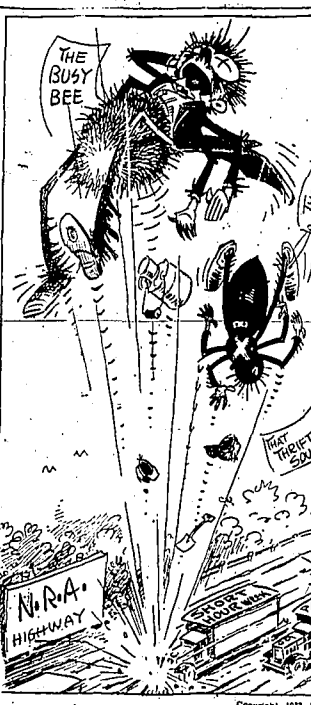
Just six weeks after starting his aerial cruise to the Chicago World's fair, the Italian aviator completed the last leg of his homeward journey in a 130-mile flight from London, England.

A series of joyful welcoming festivities began as the squadron landed at the airport near Genoa, the capital's airport. Tired after 11 hours of flying, the Atlantic aviators went directly to the airport where they proposed flight over Rome which was to precede the landing.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 12 (AP)—Havana, Aug. 13 (AP)—Grisardo Machado today threw up his hands in resignation and fled for his life in a plane toward the Bahamas while behind him mobs of Cubans, his supporters and Carlos Manuel de Céspedes became the new executive of the republic.

At least 21 persons were slain and more than 200 injured. Many bodies may have been left on the streets, forgotten. A violent electric storm this evening kept temporarily halted the activities of the demonstrators.

Manuel de Céspedes, former ambassador to the United States, was chosen by all political groups for president. His resignation, which was to take effect on this date, and Machado's request for a 10-day absence from the country, a request which was refused, were in effect.

FRANKLIN ROOSEVELT Secretary of State Franklin Roosevelt, who ordinarily would have succeeded to the presidency, was in Miami, Florida.

His resignation was through the efforts of the Cuban people, who had elected a committee to advise the president, and the committee had drafted a new constitution which would have been adopted by the Cuban people.

The committee, headed by the late President Machado, finally decided to resign, and the committee was dissolved.

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TORRID TEMPERATURE PREVAILS OVER IDAHO

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WHEAT REDUCES CROP PROSPECTS IN IDAHO

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IDAHO PUBLISHERS ADOPT TRADE CODE

Report Man Addresses Session in Boise on Subject of Charges for Printing

BOISE, Aug. 12 (AP)—Members of the Idaho Publishers Association met today to discuss the adoption of a trade code of weekly papers but those of daily papers were disappointed by the action of the National Editorial Association, making one major change.

The code in general provides for a minimum of 45 cents an hour for male and 40 cents for female, plus 10 cents for overtime, and 10 hours may be worked in emergency.

Among several accomplishments of major importance to the state were his proposals for the Uncompagnon reclamation project in this state, and from 1912 to 1918 he was reclamation director of the state.

\$400,000,000 GOES INTO VAST PROGRAM TO ASSIST JOBLESS

Federal Experts Estimate Required Number of Man-Weeks for 25,000 Miles of Highway at 25,000,000

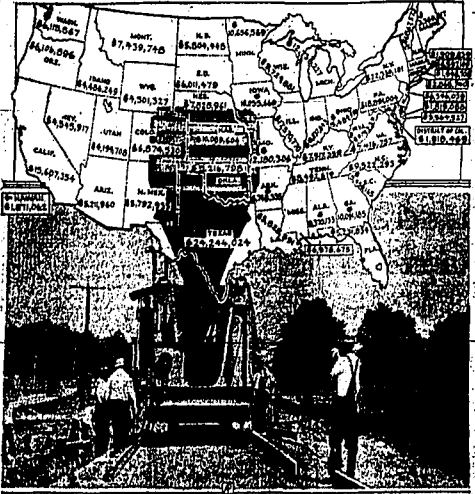
By ALEXANDER R. GEORGE (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Actual road work in the \$400,000,000 highway construction program, calculated by a federal committee, is expected to be under way in virtually all of the states.

On the basis of a 30-hour week, federal experts estimate that the building of approximately 25,000 miles of highways will require 25,000,000 man-weeks of work, including construction and the labor provided for associated activities.

Of course, the number of men that will be put on the payroll can be easily determined, highway officials point out. The number of men working 20 weeks at any given time and the duration of their employment depends on various factors such as the kind of highway projects and the influence of the weather on construction.

Highway construction records during the past three years show that the average number of men employed in highway projects is about 100,000. This means that the total man-weeks of work would be 25,000,000. That is the equivalent of about 125,000 men working 20 weeks.

Since the primary economic goal of President Roosevelt and his associates is to create jobs, the increase in mass purchasing power, public works officials stress, is the primary reason for the program. The fact that from 50 to 90 per cent of road building dollar goes to laborers is stressed.



The map shows how the \$400,000,000 allotted by the federal government for the emergency highway construction program is apportioned among the states. It is estimated that about 25,000,000 man-weeks of work will be provided.

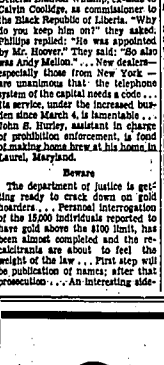
