Tattooing Unites Man And Woman

BALTIMORE, Aug. 16 (AP)—Two marks covering a husband and a wife from head to foot served today to unite the couple as a husband and wife, where the woman has critically ill with pneumonia.

The woman was taken to the hospital last Monday, after a policeman had discovered her in a cafe, shaking with chills.

There was no way to identify her, but she was the wife of a man whose name was the name "Kate Somers."

Today a policeman noticed a man standing in a doorway. The man's black hair was the same color as the woman's. The policeman remembered the story of the tattooed woman and searched the man for identification.

The man, Robert Somers, said he had married Kate three years ago and tattooed her completely, advertising her as the only woman in the world to receive the complete tattooing in both hands.

Their business, however, had not prospered and after their last encounter in New York, Somers had fled to Baltimore. She had little money to meet her "husband" where they were planned to be together.

When he reached Baltimore yesterday, Somers was puzzled. He did not know the man who was the policeman told him about the sick woman this morning did he know any one where they might be. So, the tattooed man and the tattooed woman were reunited, at her bedside. She was delirious and did not recognize him.

70 Persons Drown In Jamaica Flood

Roosevelt Moves Toward Showdown On Major Codes

President Takes Personal Command In Throwing Full Force of Government Into Broad, Economic Campaign

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt tonight was moving the administration and four of the nation's great basic industries toward an open showdown with the national producers' organization.

Out of significant conferences at the White House, NRA headquarters and in "watered-down" versions—some defining indications that the full force of government was being brought to bear on steel, coal, oil and automobiles under code of fair competition at the earliest possible moment.

Also moving into position for intervention by the administration which may find its way into the courts, was the executive order which virtually all labor for disemployment between capital and workers.

President Roosevelt took personal command of the campaign.

Family Escapes Death at Galeta

Nine Persons Live To Tell Of Stupor in Car Down Slung Mountain Grade

Filer Ram Sale Shares With Twin Falls Event In Woolmen's Interest

\$14,229 Changes Hands at Auction

BAKERSFIELD, Aug. 16—When the weekly annual Idaho ram sale drew to a close here today, \$14,229 had been paid by buyers for 160 rams declared to be the choicest rams in the state.

Approximately 300 persons attended the sale, which featured open bidding and good prices. Offered this year were 325 Hampshire rams, 160 Suffolk rams, 100 Suffolk-Hampshire rams, one Suffolk stud ram and seven Hampshire stud rams. At last year's sale the offerings included 650 Hampshire rams, 150 Suffolk rams, 150 Suffolk-Hampshire rams, R. G. Hitchcock, Boise, paid \$300 for the Suffolk stud ram of the University of Idaho, exceeding last year's top price for a Suffolk stud by \$100.

Buyers \$11,550

Olan and Turner, Rupert, reported \$11,550 for a group of three Suffolk yearlings. Next in price were two University of Idaho yearlings at \$60 each. Three Suffolk yearlings owned by Dr. O. L. Young were sold to P. J. Cooper, Boise, at \$30 each, and a pen of 10 owned by Ladlow and Brooke, Maladon, brought a total of \$200.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—Messages urging quick government action to "peg" prices of farm products were disregarded today by the department of agriculture today.

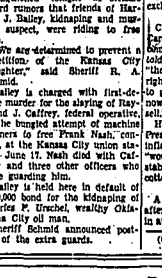
Secretary Wallace and farm administrators indicated they intended to disregard them and leave marketing regulations entirely to the agricultural market.

Roosevelt Keeps Experts Studying National Trends

Chief Executive Silently Watches Prices, Prepared To Act as Conditions of Commonwealth Dictate

(By The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt is silently watching the trend of prices and keeping a firm grip on control over money and inflation to maintain the confidence of investors.

It was reiterated today that the White House is not in a hurry to change its policy of higher interest rates, commodity prices, and wages. But there was not the slightest hinting of any new moves to the dollar strategy to guide the nation back to better days.

The president is just not talking about the complicated money problem. He has his experts at work. His debt contains chaos. Very apparently he is acting as a cautious observer.

Roosevelt Approves Of Slaughtering Hogs

WASHINGTON, Aug. 16 (AP)—President Roosevelt approved today the plan to kill two hogs with 100,000 dollars the farmers don't know how to feed and giving them to buy more hogs.

The program has been worked out by the department primarily to aid farmers who have more pigs than they can feed because of the drought in the farm belt.

Though pigs for getting the meat to the distressed unemployed have not been announced, Harry L. Hopkins, federal public administrator, said he would begin distribution as soon as he receives it and will turn it over to the most needy families.

Final details of the plan, which will be announced by Secretary Wallace Friday in an address at the Chicago exposition, were worked out today at a conference between President Roosevelt, Wallace and Hopkins.
