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CAPTAIN LEIGHTON HAS "SATISFACTORY DAY" AT HOSPITAL

Favorable Developments in Condition of Crash Victim Make Surgery Unnecessary Up to Midnight

Captain Ralph E. Leighton, critically injured Wednesday in an auto accident near King Hill, Idaho, had a "very satisfactory day" yesterday at Twin Falls county hospital, Dr. D. L. Alexander, attending physician, said. At 11 o'clock Captain Leighton's condition was reported by hospital attendants as "satisfactory."

Captain Leighton suffered a multiple skull fracture, serious contusion of the brain and several internal injuries. He was taken to the hospital at 10:30 p. m. A trepanning operation to correct results of the skull injuries had not been completed by midnight. There was no indication an operation would be necessary. Tests of spinal fluid yesterday showed no protein, resulting from the skull fracture. Spinal fluid protein is a condition which indicates an operation.

Captain Leighton last night was under observation through the night. He was in the best of health. Previously nourishment had been withheld from the patient because of the nature of his injuries. A conscious moment of the day, his pulse was better, his respiration was maintained and his mental condition was clearing up somewhat.

All members of Captain Leighton's family are here except a daughter, Mrs. Walter E. Scott, Vevor, California. She has been notified of the accident and advised by the hospital to await further word of her husband's condition.

Captain James W. Porter, superintendent of the Twin Falls county hospital, said he expected to be in his hospital room by 11:30 p. m. He was permitted to walk another day.

C. C. Henderson, confined to his room at the Park hotel with severe leg fracture, had a "very satisfactory day" yesterday. His injuries are not serious.

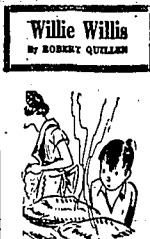

ANTI-REPEAL SPEAKERS BEGIN ADDRESS SERIES

Dr. Elijah Hall Longbrake, pastor of the Twin Falls Methodist church, will be the first speaker in a series of anti-repeal addresses to be given by the Twin Falls Christian church, acting for the Radio Defense League. The prohibition organization, however, has been a series of three-week addresses over the radio since the beginning of the year. The first address was given on September 18, the day before Idaho voted on repeal of the Eighteenth Amendment.

The organization's purpose is to have Idaho "stand out as one state which is not reorganizing." "We are not reorganizing," they are trying to show conclusively that the prohibition laws which will be repealed," Dr. Longbrake said last night.

TROTZKY FOREGOES PRELIMINARY MOVE

Asserted Russian Sportsman Awaits Hearing on Charge of Unlawful Practice

R. M. Trotsky, dapper sportsman and asserted boxer of Leon Trotsky, former Russian Soviet leader, waived preliminary hearing in a justice court here yesterday on a charge of practicing medicine and surgery without a state license and was held under \$1000 bond to answer to an indictable misdemeanor charge in the district court. The maximum penalty is \$1000 fine and one-year term. He was arraigned yesterday in justice of the Peace Guy J. Bove's court, E. L. Haysom, Twin Falls appearing as his attorney.

Complaint on which Trotsky was arrested at Boise early in Wednesday afternoon that he was engaged in illegal practice of medicine and surgery in Twin Falls July 13 and 14, "intra extra" times during the past year, was filed by Probate Judge, state traffic officer, signed the complaint in the name of the state clerk of the court, and Trotsky was delivered into his custody by Sheriff Frank E. Hayes yesterday.

Trotsky said officers took his wife and child, who were here for a time, to the relative in California.

He claims to have applied for a license to practice medicine and surgery in Idaho, and asserts that he is a graduate of a Russian medical school.

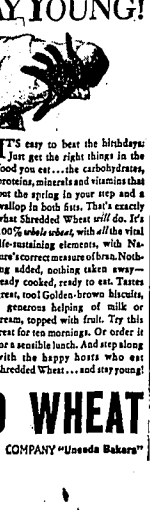

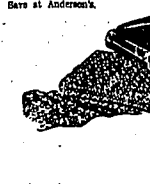

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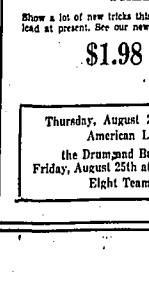
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Store Owner Says Unsettled Prices Retard Purchases

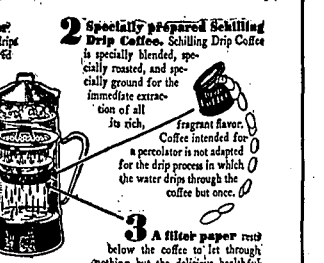

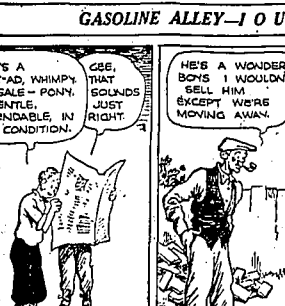
