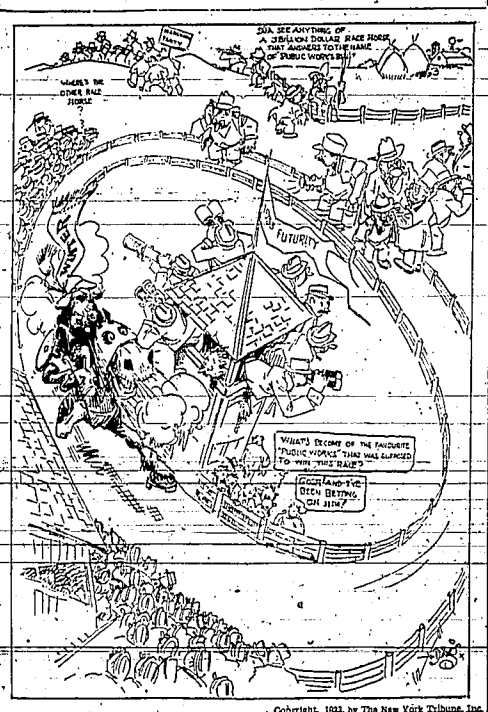

50 Representatives of Pro-ducer Associations Attend District Luncheon

Jerome, Sept. 28 (Special to the News)—Fifty representatives of producer associations including men from Burley, Rupert, Soda, Twin Falls and Pocatello, were entertained at a district, state cooperative council luncheon, by Jerome agribusiness men at the Hotel Jerome.

Dr. Smith, vice president of the council and manager of the Jerome office, was master of ceremonies. 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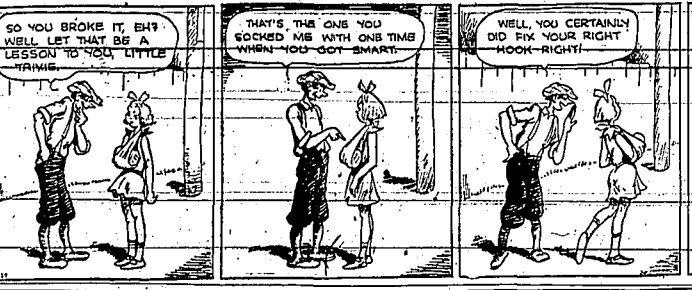

Stop-Loss Selling Leads To Maximum Sellback Of 2 1/2-Cents-on-Bushel

By JOHN P. BOUGHAN (Chicago Press Staff Editor) CHICAGO, Sept. 25.—(5)—Stop-loss selling led to a maximum setback of 2 1/2 cents a bushel in wheat today, but better buying support then appeared and moderate rallies ensued.

Wheat closed nervous, 5c to 15c under yesterday's finish, corn 1c to 1 1/2c down; oats 1/2c to 3/4c off, and provisions varying from 10c decline to 20c advance.

Notwithstanding the latest prices for wheat came in the lowest, and that among other things today were liquidating their lines, a sharp pronounced tendency was shown in some quarters to buy wheat with high prices followed news that conferences at London to fix a quota for Russian wheat exports had proved unproductive.
