\$238,000,000 GOES INTO CREATION OF 32 NEW WARCRRAFT

Experts Expect Program to Produce 2,430,000 Man Weeks of Work to Reduce Ranks of Jobless

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7.—The \$238,000,000 naval construction program under way will create an estimated 2,430,000 man weeks of work and will benefit many thousands of mechanics and trades which will be called upon to assist in the building of the 32 new warcraft.

No matter what the opinion of other countries may be, the government, it has just been made known, is to carry out this program as planned.

Naval officials say that about 75 per cent of about \$100 million of a billion dollars in public works money to be expended in the states before the United States recedes to London treaty limits.

Twin Falls Highway District Appropriates \$2500 For Emergency Employment

Twin Falls highway district commissioners yesterday appropriated \$2500 for emergency employment relief highway construction under provisions of the governor's emergency relief highway program lately authorized here by Patrick P. Carter, chairman of the state relief committee.

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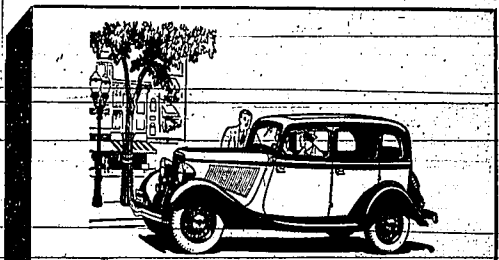

WASHINGTON, Oct. 7 (AP)—A decrease of nearly 50 per cent in the acres burned by fires in the national forests this year was reported today by the Forest Service.

Ray Hession, chief of operations, credited the reduction, which set an all-time low to the work of civilian conservation corps in fighting blazes and in fire prevention.

The decrease in the number of fire-accidents this year, which is the first since the year 1932, is the lowest since 1927. The average blazes burned in the previous five years was 69,479 acres.

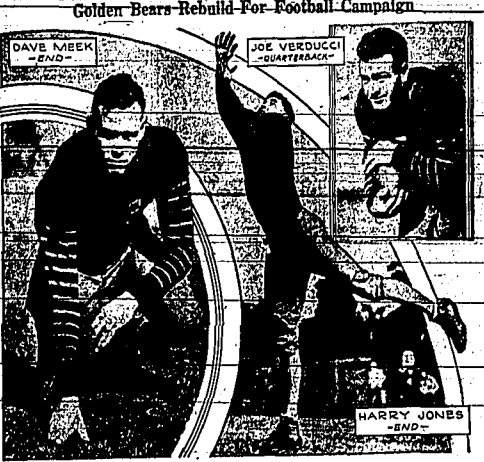

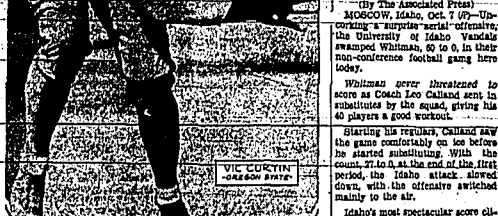

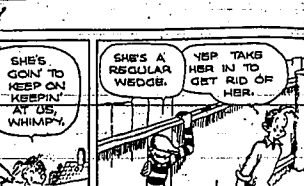
