GERMANY SAYS ARMS DEMANDS NOT RIGID

Representative Consults at Disarmament Conference With American Delegate

BERLIN, Oct. 10 (AP)—Rudolf Heines, German representative at the disarmament conference, today told the United States that Germany has not rigid demands on armaments.

In the course of a conference between the two representatives, Heines said everything regarding armaments which concerns Germany is subject to discussion.

He said Germany does not desire armaments for her army which is not to be reorganized, and that she would accept a general armaments of a type which will eventually be equal for all nations.

In some quarters among the conference delegates, it was thought a solution to the apparent French proposal by such a reduction of Germany would be permitted to acquire the armaments prohibited to her under the Versailles treaty.

Great Britain appeared today to be adamant against allowing military airplanes to Germany.

# INVESTMENT TRUST DIRECTORS APPEAR AT STOCK INQUIRY

## Senate Banking Committee Under Ferdinand Pecora Shows Stock-Dumped-In Portfolio as Hinged Loss

(The Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—A figure pattern of evidence to show "directors" of two different trusts in their portfolios stocks on which heavy losses had been incurred together before the senate banking committee today by Ferdinand Pecora, counsel in its stock market inquiry.

In close questioning of E. B. Tracy, president of the First National Bank and Trust Co. of Chicago, and the United States and International Securities Corporation, Pecora brought out the holdings of the latter for \$23,000,000 since 1929, and that \$11,000,000 of the deposits had been sold on the railroad stocks.

Charles Hayden, a director, was chairman of the board of directors of the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific, and F. H. Ecker, a trust director, was chairman of the other group, the St. Louis and San Francisco.

Seven companies head

They said he was an officer or director of the companies whose stock was in the portfolios of the International trust as of December 31, 1932, and that the value of the stock was considerably more than current market value.

Tracy said that of these stocks in the company's portfolio was around \$4,000,000. Tracy agreed—about that amount. He said 100,000 shares of the Louisiana Land company of which Tracy was president, had been sold and had a market value December 31 of \$700,000.

Tracy said that large blocks of the railroad stocks were sold by Dillon, Read and company to the development trust, but that although it was sold to the United States Foreign Trust it subsequently returned to the development trust and International.
