Public Hysterical In Health Matters Educator Asserts

CHICAGO, Oct. 14 (AP)—The public is hysterical in health matters, President Robert Hayward Hutchins of the University of Chicago told the American College of Surgeons last night.

"Health has succeeded happiness as the pre-occupation of mankind," the young educator said. "It was the principal speaker at the annual convention of the medical body."

Consequently, he inferred, the medical profession has an obligation to be intelligible to patients.

During the development of medicine, he said, the intelligibility of Hutchins said, and he suggested it might now be rich in facts and poor in logic.

Dr. Frederic A. Bailey, Washington, chairman of the program, said he had proposed to the American College of Surgeons that the medical body should be required to furnish medical attention for their employes, including their families.

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SHEEP MEN FIND BUSINESS BETTER

Idaho—Wool-Growers—Hear F. R. Marshall at Annual Pocatello Meeting

POCATELLO, Oct. 14 (AP)—Reports of more favorable conditions for the wool grower were brought to Idaho sheep men gathered at a banquet here by F. R. Marshall, secretary of the National Wool Growers' Association.

"We have finally reached the place where we can again say that the sheep business is a pretty good business again," he said in an address and one of the features of the national association which he said had resulted in "many of the basic conditions which make it possible for the sheep men to keep going."

Among those he mentioned the wool tariff, which he said there was no reason to believe would be changed and the settlement of the old forest grazing fee dispute with the department of the interior. The settlement of stockyards charges, he said, is still hanging fire, due to opposition by the Kansas City interests.

He predicted firm prices for next year's wool and said that in view of a short lamb crop, prices for that commodity should return to a profitable level.

The highest bid was made by the R. C. Rich company, buyer, paying \$4 per head for a pen of ten Panama yearlings, owned by Laidlow and Brooks of Muldoon.

Lamb Not Included

Explaining that the National Wool Growers' association has not asked that lamb be treated as basic agricultural commodity, Mr. Marshall said that would be restricted to only a slight increase in lamb prices and would have brought more price for wool.

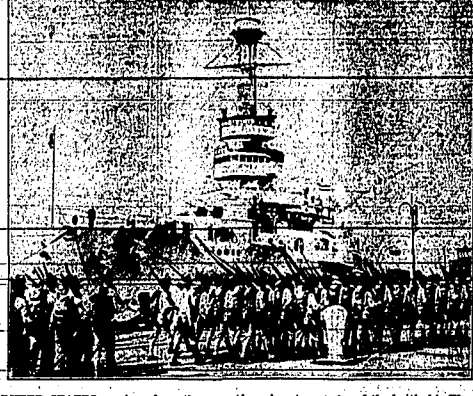

Japan, like Germany, announced its resignation effective two years ago, but presumably neither nation plans to participate in future deliberations of the league.

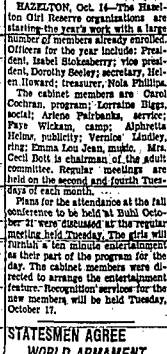

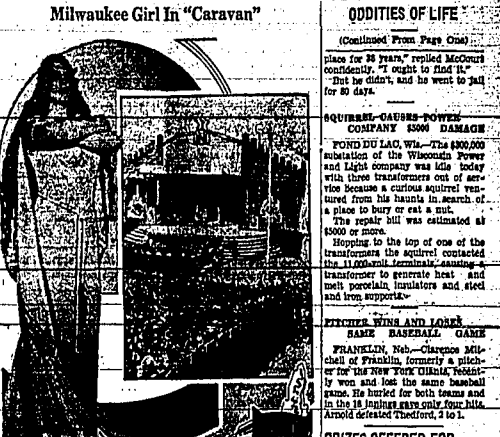

Grand Coulee Dam Project To Harness Columbia River

Reclamation Program Aids Northwest

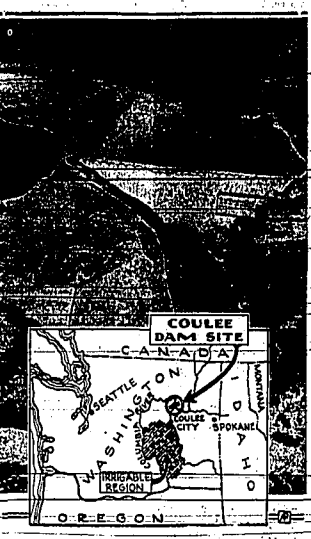
GRAND COULEE, Wash., Oct. 10.—Here a great project of Washington where the mighty sometimes climbs to 123 degrees in the shade, reclamation service engineers are completing preliminary studies for the \$60,000,000 Grand Coulee dam in the Columbia river.

Reclamation engineer has the national public works board have approved the construction of this first unit of a great reclamation project. Halting the mighty river as it dashes through boulder canyons, the structure and accompanying power plant will provide work for at least 4000 men and generate electric energy for miles in Romanians. The dam will be 6700 feet long, as well as irrigate thousands of acres.

James O'Sullivan, chairman of the Washington Columbia Basin commission, presented the preliminary plan to be started "by next spring," but others believe it will be the summer of 1934 before work begins. Construction is expected to require four years.

Preliminary Financing—By \$60,000,000 The state of Washington drew \$60,000,000 in a bond issue for the preliminary work.

Conference Begins Decision To Join Forces In Resistance To Reservoir-District's Contentions In Suit

Twelve irrigation waterusers, except those of American Falls reservoir district No. 2, Gooding and of the opinion that their water rights will be adversely affected if the district was a suit that is started today in the Idaho district court as a result of the decision of the Idaho officials of a dozen irrigation districts and canal companies in conference here yesterday.

Districts and companies represented in the conference decided to make common cause in a suit to be brought against the district of the south, herein American Falls reservoir district No. 2, to resist its claim to use of 100 second feet of direct flow water appropriated to the right of the corporation to share any other interest to American Falls river water in the state.

Attorneys Ray F. Mann and J. D. Anderson, according to the conference decision, upper river waterusers will designate legal counsel to confer with attorneys for the district, American Falls reservoir district, Twin Falls, and the Twin Falls and Idaho canal companies, in working out a plan of procedure.

Defendants named in the suit are the directors of the Idaho Falls, Twin Falls, state commissioner of reclamation, Lyons Crane, secretary of the Idaho Falls reservoir district, the state commissioner of reclamation, and the directors of the American Falls reservoir district.

The state commissioner of reclamation was yesterday, along with Assistant Attorney Brown and officials of the Progressive and Idaho irrigation districts, Idaho Falls; Snake River Valley irrigation district, Idaho Falls; Springfield Canal company, Aberdeen; Minidoka irrigation district, Irwin; Idaho Falls canal company, Twin Falls; North Bleds Canal company, Jerome; Twin Falls Canal company, American Falls reservoir district.

Chairman of the Upper Watershed Protective association was chairman of the conference here today, and John Lee, Idaho Falls, was secretary.

It would be possible for the district to use 3000 or 18000 second feet of water at any time before the end of the storage season at the American Falls reservoir, the amount of water thus used would be charged against its direct flow appropriation to irrigation.

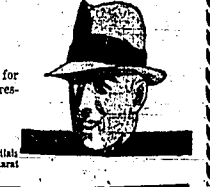
