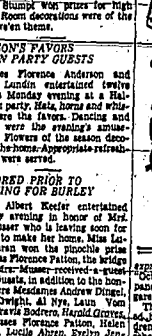

### CASSIA'S HIGHWAY PROGRAM SPEEDED

Malta Commissioner Reports Progress In Construction Of 30 South From Burley

BURLEY, Oct. 31.—Arthur B. Pierce, county commissioner, visiting in Burley Monday, stated that work on the 30 south of the Burley Highway under the direction of the state department of public works is progressing rapidly, while bonds were issued, under the federal aid program, which is being entirely completed before winter sets in. The highway is 22 miles in length and was completed in 1928 and is now being reconstructed. The original highway was laid out and constructed about 12 years ago by the Burley Highway district and was a one-way highway. The reconstruction of the highway is being completed by the county and the state department of public works. The highway is being reconstructed in two sections. The first section is from the Burley Highway south and easterly through Johnson and Idaho to the 74th line. The second section is about 200 men, mostly of the three highway districts, immediately following its organization.

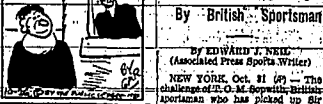

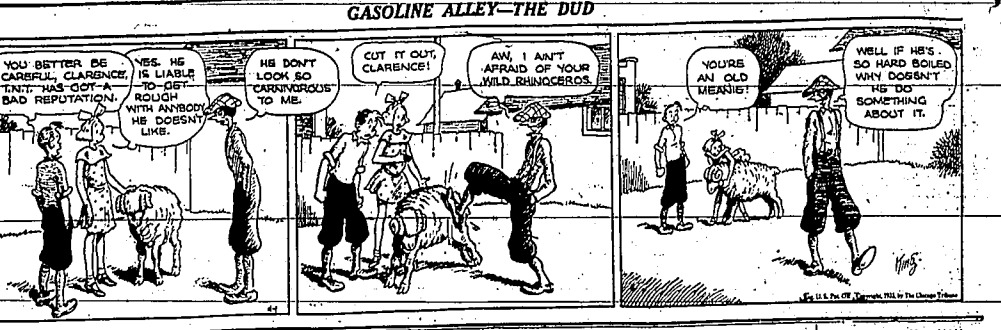

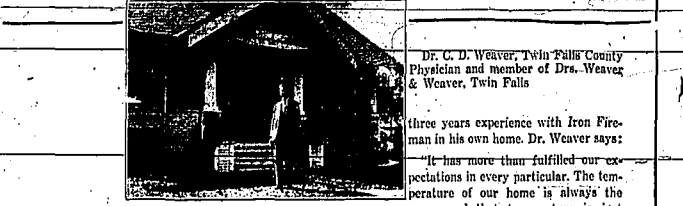
