### COURT'S DECISION FAVORS CASH BUYER OF IDAHO PRODUCE

#### Tribunal's Ruling Sustains Murtaugh Man's Contentions in Resistance to License Law Enforcement

(By The Associated Press) BOISE, Nov. 2.—The state supreme court today ruled that the Idaho produce license law does not apply to dealers buying for cash.

The decision was written by Justice C. D. Little, and concurred in by all members of the court.

The decision reversed a ruling of District Judge Adam B. Barclay holding that W. C. Hall of Murtaugh, who has been fined and required to secure a license and post up the \$500 bond for dealer's registration of the fact he bought for cash.

The supreme court held in the opinion of Hall that buying for cash is a violation of his constitutional rights. The supreme court held the law is invalid primarily to protect growers dealing through commission merchants.

"To have it apply to cash buyers who completed the transaction at once, the court held, would be a violation of the right to a trial by jury and of the right to a fair trial."

An injunction was issued against the state commissioner against the law in the future to prevent him from having the dealer arrested for failure to get a license.

#### ARTISIAN WATERUSERS WIN FIGHT FOR PRIOR RIGHTS

BOISE, Nov. 2.—William H. Hoot and Arthur H. Hoot, owners of the Hoots, today were assured of their rights in a subterranean water basin against later comers who they protested had been taking necessary water from them.

The supreme court ruled that if later appropriators share in the water they must bear any cost necessary to secure the flow property retaining its water rights.

Hoot operated a pump to bring the water to his land under the ground basin but when later appropriators also began putting in pumps, the water in the basin arrived, operating at lower levels, contained the pumps leaked but the cost had to be borne by the ground for such a contention.

Cost of installing a new pump on the Hoot property was estimated by an engineer before the district court at \$125. The Hoot property had two pumps.

The supreme court advised the district court to decree the Hoot property the right to the water it had used before, without any cost, and if the others continued to demand water from the basin they must see that the water appropriators are provided for.

#### COURT RULES ATTACHMENT EXTENDS TO WATER RIGHTS

BOISE, Nov. 2.—The state supreme court today ruled that water rights appurtenant to land held by the Filer Livestock company are covered by an attachment by the Federal Land bank of San Francisco against the holdings of Joseph Keeler and J. J. Keeler, former Twin Falls bankers, and could be held to protect the interest of the reserve bank.

An attack on the claim was filed by James H. Doherty of Twin Falls who had claims against the Keelers and who named them as defendants in a suit to collect. The federal reserve bank intervened and the district court held its rights were paramount in the case.

#### COMMODITIES PRICES SHOW NARROW ADVANCE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Increase of one half of one per cent in wholesale commodity prices during the week ended October 29, placing the index at 103, was reported today by the bureau of labor statistics.

For the two weeks prior to October 29 prices showed a downward trend. Prominent advances in wholesale prices of farm products and manufactured goods, however, were reported as the chief cause of the rise in the general level of prices.

The bureau used 1925 as 100 in fixing the index price.

### MARTIN ASKS BOARD TO RETAIN WARDEN

#### Former Attorney General Blames "Temporary Explosion" for Rudd's Troubles

BOISE, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Frank Martin of Boise, former attorney general and once a member of the prison board, today appealed to the present board to retain Warden George Rudd at the penitentiary rather than to demand his resignation because of a "temporary explosion of public temperance sentiment."

Neither Secretary of State Franklin D. Roosevelt nor Attorney General Cummings expanded their statements of the night in which they expressed the view the warden should tender the resignation as soon as the governor could leave the hospital to attend a meeting of the board, of which all are members.

"It would appear that Warden Rudd of the state penitentiary has perhaps been unfortunate too great a number of times to retain the position," Martin said.

"No one, probably, would approve of politics, theatre parties and tennis matches on the public courts for the state."

"A careful examination of the statements of the members of the board who have suggested Warden Rudd's resignation, however, seems to indicate they have acted too hastily."

"In view of the extreme leniency extended to prisoners by the board of pardons which is composed of the same men who constitute the prison board, it is surprising that with this record as a basis, Warden Rudd's resignation should be recommended."

He urged that if Warden Rudd is an outstanding personification of the state penitentiary, it is the duty of the board to retain him, and to a contract to make for pictures. ### Chief of Police Offers Weapons for War on Criminals

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Eight recommendations for improving the government's hand in its drive against criminals were presented to Attorney General Cummings today on behalf of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. The association had been requested by Cummings to set forth the suggestions through its emergency crime committee, Philip T. Bell, police chief of Newark, New Jersey, for president of the international association, and Peter Glorioso, chief of Bergen county, New Jersey, represented the committee.

The recommendations included: Revision of laws of criminal procedure in order to hasten trials. Establishment of a universal fingerprinting system.

Permanence of tenure for heads of police departments, with those appointed by a non-political board and removed only on specific charges considered to be an open working of the board.

Refusal of bail for any criminal awaiting trial for a felony, awaiting a new trial, or pending an appeal. Making it a federal offense to transport or sell any firearms, explosives or other dangerous weapons from one state to another.

Appointment of a judge of criminal courts for life contingent upon good behavior.

### HEAVY SEAS DELAY WORK ON GOLDEN GATE BRIDGE

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Heavy seas which swept in through the Golden Gate Tuesday carried away the top of a 1100-foot construction pier for the Golden Gate bridge and officials said work on the span would be delayed 30 days by the mishap.

In addition to damage to the wharf, the seals destroyed three units of the first tender section being built to protect the huge pier on the San Francisco side of the span.

### HURRICANE WRECKS HAYCOCK IN NORTHWESTERN JAMAICA

KINGSTON, Jamaica, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Patched-up communication lines brought word Wednesday that ten deaths and about \$100,000 damage had been caused by the hurricane which struck the northwestern section of Jamaica last week end. Scores were homeless, their houses having been wrecked and carried away by the terrific wind and storm. It was estimated that 80 per cent of the banana crop was lost.

The outbreak area was cut off from the rest of the colony after telegraph and telephone lines were felled and roads blocked.

When communication was restored today the toll was reported to be 100 greater than previously estimated.

### ROAD WORK DELAY IRKS LEWISTON'S CHAMBER

LEWISTON, Idaho, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Excessive "extreme displacement" at delay of the state in allowing money to complete the six mile link of the Lewis and Clark highway between Spading and Murta, the Lewiston chamber of commerce demanded its construction in a resolution passed Thursday and addressed to Governor C. Dean Ross and J. H. Stemmer, director of highways.

The resolution vigorously criticizes the state officials, and asserts that the highway, a federal aid project, has been on the state construction program since July, but no funds have been appropriated because of "seeming lack of cooperation on the part of the state authorities."

The road is the only uncompleted portion of the highway between Lewiston and Oroton and other Clearwater county towns.

# MURDER SUSPECT STARTS LONG TRIP TO CLEAR HIS NAME

Texan Officers Arrive at End of 1800-Mile Drive To Claim K. L. Combs, Long Known Here as Ed Collins

Kenneth L. Combs, 34, veteran of the World War aviation corps who had been known here for nearly eight years as Ed Collins, a mechanic, is to leave today with Sheriff Frank Bennett of Blaine county, Texas, and a deputy, Cy Davis, returning to Clifton, Texas, to answer to charges in connection with the murder of Dr. Owen Carpenter at Clifton, nearly three years ago.

The Texas officers arrived early yesterday at the end of an 1800-mile automobile trip that occupied nearly four days and that they took through snowflakes in Wyoming.

Combs surrendered himself to Twin Falls police officers last Saturday, explaining that he wanted to "clear his name."

Combs' arrest was wanted to delay his Sunday evening after celebrating Combs' identity through communications with his father, Paul Combs, and hearing that Combs would not resist extradition.

Edna Long Search Sheriff Benson referred her yesterday to continuing effort that Texas authorities have put forth to come along this morning from Blaine county, Tex. after the murder of the Clifton physician.

Edna Long, sheriff, who was awarded \$4500 offer for Combs' apprehension.

Combs, the sheriff said, was a mechanic in a garage at Clifton, Tex. when he was released by Texas authorities at the end of the year.

Combs was found dead in Smith's house. The body was pierced by eight bullets that caused 22 perforations, the sheriff said. The gun with which he was slain was found in an automobile in the yard.

Combs was held in a cell two after the killing, and then released shortly before a grand jury named him as an individual in connection with the murder.

Smith did not know Combs in the murder when he went to trial, the sheriff said.

It had not been decided last night whether Combs, a former Wood, Texas, would return to Texas with Combs and the officers.

During their visit here yesterday, Sheriff Benson was presented with an expression of appreciation of the Twin Falls country, its natural resources, its attractiveness, and the courtesy that had been extended to him here.
