PRESIDENT GREETETS MAYMA LITVINOFF SOVIET COMMISSAR

Roosevelt Meets Russian in Prelude to Discussions Involving Restoration of Two Countries' Relations

BY SAM BLEDSOE (Associated Press Staff Writer) WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—In the White House today, President Roosevelt, tonight greeted Mayma Litvinoff, Soviet commissar for the restoration of foreign affairs, as a prelude to discussions which may lead to the restoration of relations between the two nations.

It was the first time in 18 years that an American president has received an official representative of the Soviet government. Litvinoff was only a preliminary to formal conferences which surrounded it was significant of the change in attitude the American government has toward Russia.

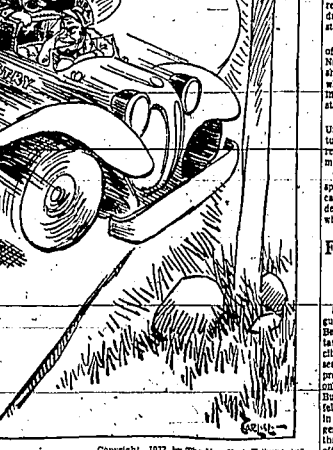

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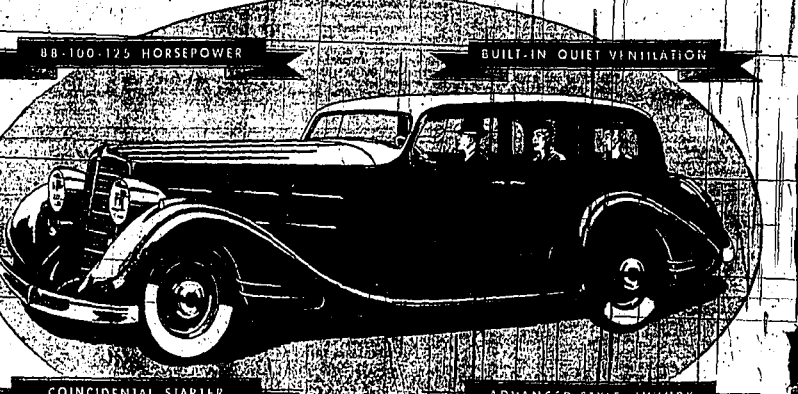

BRITAIN MOVES TO QUOT-TARIFF TRUCE

Board of Trade Trade House Of Commons Trade Arms-nice Has Lost Value

LONDON, Nov. 14—The house of commons today took a dramatic session today that Great Britain will not agree to withdraw from a world tariff treaty December 1 and that the government will make a token payment of \$25,000 on the way down to America.
Two other outstanding problems were mentioned in the hour that they were taken up by Westminster after a 12-minute recess.
Great Britain's disarmament stand which Foreign Secretary Sir John Simon said would be based on an effort to bring about a general arms limitation, and continuing negotiations for improved trade with Soviet Russia.
Walter Runciman, president of the board of trade, was cheered when he said he had been told by the labor secretary last summer by American Ambassador Norman H. Davis no longer is of any practical value because four nations have given notice of withdrawal and two have made reservations.
The announcement of Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer, that President Roosevelt accepted the British offer of the token payment and does not regard Britain as in default on the installment of approximately \$110,000 due December 15 was fully expected.
Afterward the commons, settled on a resolution of no confidence in the cabinet at the end of the session.
The British tariff matter was negotiated prior to the convening of the economic conference and Sweden, Netherlands, the Irish Free State, Sweden and Switzerland have given notice of withdrawal from the conference. France and Denmark have made reservations.
The truce was made in cooperation of the economic parity which required all the arts of diplomacy that the American envoy could muster.
It was planned to break a vicious circle by tariff warfare, but when nothing was built on the conference it began to crumble.
What influence the new American gold policy had on the breakdown of the debt negotiations was not clear in Mr. Chamberlain's statement, but a communique from President Roosevelt says that the economic discussions which were under way in Washington were abandoned until the world economic monetary situation could be clarified.

RUSSIA SLAPS AT APPEARANCE

Warning to Tokyo Shares With Expression of Hope For American Recognition

MOSCOW, Nov. 14—The Soviet government's hope for a successful outcome of the Warsaw negotiations and a sharp warning to Japan to keep hands off in the Soviet Far East were the main messages of the council of ministers.
He spoke in the presence of Joseph Stalin, President Kalinin, and other high officials of the government and the Communist party in a solemn meeting in the Moscow Kremlin halling the sixteenth anniversary of the October revolution which will be celebrated throughout the country tomorrow.
Molotov declared that President Roosevelt's action in initiating discussions looking to a resumption of diplomatic relations "is one of the proofs strengthening our international position, which was attained because peace has been the basis of our foreign policy."
Turning to the Japanese question, Molotov maintained that "the carrying out of our policy of peace does not depend entirely on us."
"It rests also on the plans and intentions of other countries toward the Soviet Union."
That is why he questioned Japanese interests over country.
China Broken Treaties
The speaker declared that Soviet proposal to sell the Chinese Eastern railway and the failure to obtain the signature of Japan to a non-aggression pact "is an intolerable insult."
"Events in Manchuria show that treaties and contracts between the Soviet Union and Manchuria and Japan have not been kept."
Further, the Japanese press becomes increasingly more insolent in publishing plans for the annexation of Siberia.
"This causes us to be very attentive and compelled us to prepare for unexpected events. The government of Manchuria is not responsible for this situation."
"What is the master there and is responsible for everything, so while striving to keep friendly relations everywhere, we shall continue as in

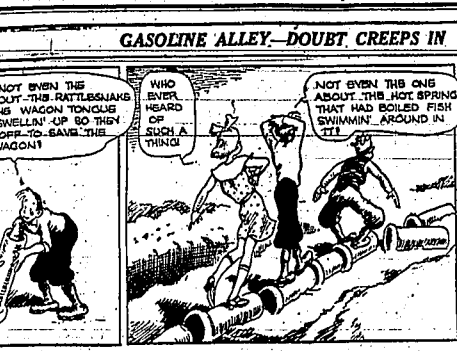

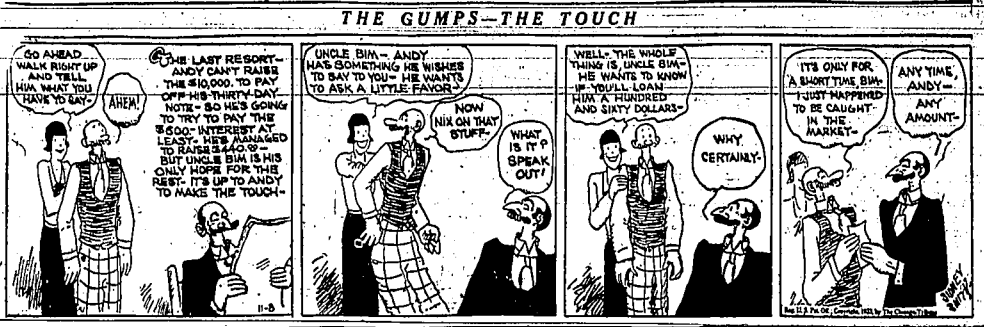

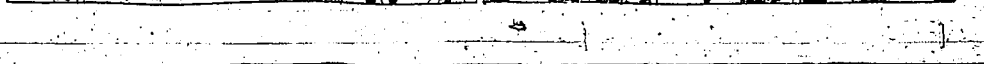
