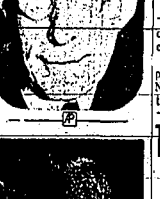

Merge into National Convention at Idaho Capital

ROME, Nov. 15 (AP)—Moose was the outstanding leader tonight for the next annual convention of the state group but delegates are expected to go into an early morning session before making the selection and appointing other officers.

Meetings of the national group took precedence over state sessions and a late call was necessary before adjournment.

A resolution was passed to hold the annual convention in late October or early November and it was generally conceded there would be a decision of officers, but W. W. Deal to carry over another term as state master.

Members of the legislative committee were expected to remain for part of the national convention, but until Friday when the seventh degree is to be conferred.

The resolution introduced by the Ada county man, calls upon the committee to take over the money and banking system of the country and "operate it for the benefit of the people instead of for the private interest of the money lender."

As a fourth item the speaker stated that all forms of gambling in stock and the products of labor should be taxed as they are in the industrialized countries.

He pleaded for application of the tariff principle to protect the home market for agriculture and outlined five factors bearing on the present economic situation—prices, wages, taxes and money.

He urged broadening of the tax burden. "There must be no tax dodgers in America," he asserted, "it is well to point out that excessive salaries should be immediately curbed by taxation."

Turning to prohibition, the Grange master said repeal across a three-year challenge for education "in the temperance and sobriety."

WALLACE ASKS FOR NATIONAL DECISION ON TARIFF POLICY

United States Must Either Reduce Duties or Production of Farm Secretary Tells Indiana Audience

By The Associated Press
MUNICH, Ind., Nov. 15.—Secretary Wallace last night asked that America take a possible either-or decision on tariff or curbing production or a compromise between the two and to be prepared to announce his decision for from 10 to 15 days.

In an address which had his House approval of the tariff law and his endorsement of a banquet opening the corn-hog production of the nation, Wallace said an early but deliberate decision as to its tariff policy.

Wallace said a planned program will be essential whether the policy adopted is international or national. He said, visualizing a standard of living "two or three times that of the nation's reach should it pursue a definite plan.

Wallace said the secretary of agriculture said in the third and last speech of his visit through the midwest in behalf of the administration program, "once we fully understand the situation, it is our duty to reduce the tariff on the farm products which we export."

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RECORDS DISCLOSE SPUD CROP MOVING

Most of Idaho's Important Competitive Districts Ship More Than Last Year

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 15 (U. S. Market News Service).—Somewhat heavier state and national shipment of potatoes since the middle of last year have apparently arrested the upward course of the potato market for the time being and temporarily discouraged activity at shipping points. While "terminal" prices were not considered excessive, a wider distribution was deemed desirable if recent loadings were to continue. Secondary handling service which is active after the middle of the month was being anticipated by some operators and certain loads of potatoes were being made prior to the expiration date of the additional

Despite the much talked of tendency of producers to hold for higher prices or later sale, Idaho and the rest of the state of potatoes interest to Idaho potato men have shipped more potatoes than they had a year ago. With the exception of Wisconsin and Michigan, which have lagged behind 1932 in potato production, the national competitive districts show a greater crop movement so far than for the corresponding period of last year. Idaho's shipments passed the 8000 car mark the end of last week, the state having approximately 20 percent greater for 1933 than for 1932.

The official estimate of the potato crop as of November 15 was 27,420,000 bushels for the United States and 19,000,000 bushels for Idaho. This is an increase of 10,000,000 bushels or 3.5 per cent for the country as a whole and 50,000 bushels or 0.3 per cent for Idaho.

The national estimate stands over 600,000 bushels lower for the 1933 crop than for the 1932 crop and the Idaho estimate is now 800,000 bushels below the crop of the previous season. The increase in production of 1933 being attributed largely to a reduction in acreage as well as to an increase in estimates was generally expected.

Other states for which a larger crop was apparent during the month of October included Wyoming, Utah, Oregon, California, New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa, North Dakota, South Dakota, and Nebraska. The estimates for Wisconsin and Washington, Idaho, and Kansas. No change was made in the figures for Montana, Colorado, Washington, Idaho, and Kansas.

The estimates continue to show a larger crop in the Northwest and on the Pacific coast than last season. Crop temperatures have been in Maine and cold weather may curtail the movement at times. On the other hand the holiday project in Wisconsin is being discontinued and warehouse operations resumed.

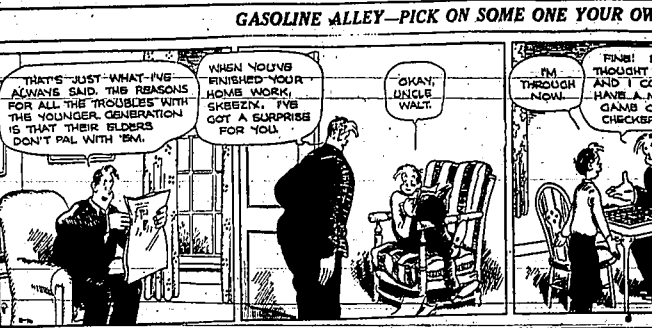
