BANKS GET CALL TO DARE TRANSACTIONS

Senate Committee Asks for Information on Loans for Stock Market Financing

 WASHINGTON, Nov. 16.—In an effort to obtain a full picture of stock market financing, the senate banking committee has sent a questionnaire to the nation's largest banks asking what money they have loaned in recent years for stock transactions.

The secretary of this move today, the committee continued its inquiry into market deals, first through an intensive study of the records and testimony of the formation of the American Equipment Corp. in 1929.

RENOUNDED LAWYER FACES PRISON TERM

Leader J. Kresel Convicted Of Aiding in Misapplication of Bank's Funds

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—Leader J. Kresel, once a criminal lawyer, was convicted yesterday on charges growing out of the collapse of the Bank of United States.

The defendant, Kresel, director and counsel for the bank, was the third man to be pronounced guilty of aiding in misapplication of funds. Bernard K. Marcus, former president, and Saul Singer, former vice president, were convicted earlier in the same trial.

The attorney was convicted by a jury in the misapplication of \$2,000,000 of the funds of the bank of the institution.

Kresel, whose intimate knowledge of the law has whetted many a defendant in the shadow of his law, faces a maximum term of seven years' imprisonment.

Without comment, Kresel heard the jury declare him guilty. A jury that had listened to former Governor Alfred E. Smith, Samuel Seabury and others testify to his good character. John W. Davis, Democratic presidential nominee in 1924, had headed his staff of defense counsel.

Kresel, who in 1920 crusaded with Seabury against corruption in the legislature's courts, was allowed liberty on \$100,000 bail, pending appeal.

FOOD INDEX FOR WEEK DISCLOSES WIDE GAINS

NEW YORK, Nov. 16 (AP)—The Bureau of Labor Statistics today disclosed that the food index for the week ended November 12 showed one of the widest gains this year, advancing 7 cents over the previous week to 127, compared with 121 for the same week last year.

The cumulative increase over the past four weeks amounted to 12 cents and marks the highest point reached since the peak of "food prices" was recorded during the week of July 18, when the index stood at 126.

FARM GIRL CONVICTED OF MAIL GARRIB'S DEATH

EDWARDSVILLE, Ill., Nov. 16 (AP)—A circuit court jury here yesterday convicted Stella Christoff, 17-year-old farm girl, of manslaughter in her trial for the slaying of Nelson Christoff, 16-year-old mail carrier.

She trafficked the shot and killed the mail carrier July 13 because she feared he was going to divorce her. But the state charged robbery was her motive.

She may be sentenced for from 1 to 14 years imprisonment.

For two years she saved her money so she could make the Portland trip; she was preparing to enter the hospital when she learned of the surgeon's death. Dr. Coffey's son then assured her the operation would be performed as promised.

LIQUOR CONTROL PLAN PROPOSED

Officials of Administration Consider Organization of Government Corporation

WASHINGTON, Nov. 16 (AP)—Organization of a government corporation to control the liquor supply of the country is among the proposals under consideration in administration circles.

It was made clear that the purpose of such a corporation would be to control the production and supply and to simplify tax collections rather than to control retail sales.

No official would discuss details of the proposal, but the "administration's" interest in liquor control is clear. The plan would be to create a government corporation or trust to control liquor. 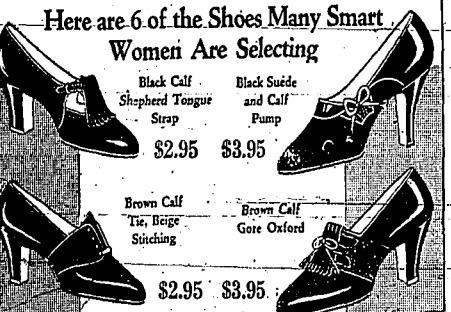

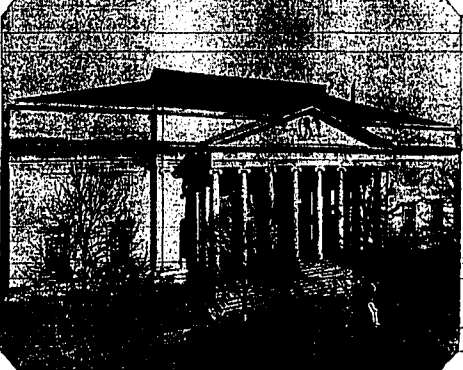

VETERANS' LEADER CHARGES TAX SHIFT

Men-Who Served In Spanish War Hit Hardest By Economy Bill, Edmunds Asserts

On an official visit to Central Utah camp, United States Veterans, Twin Falls, Ralph Edwards, Idaho Falls, Idaho department commander and one of four members of the national organization's executive committee, last evening expressed the national organization's opinion that the proposed tax shift is a diabolical scheme on the part of Wall Street to shift the burden of caring for disabled veterans from its shoulders to the shoulders of small business, small business men and farmers.

This government took \$300,000,000 from the federal veterans fund. That is a burden that must be assumed by altered, increased local levies.

The principal source of federal revenues out of which pensions have been paid is the federal income tax. Thirty thousand wealthy men and corporations pay 80 per cent of that tax. The ordinary farmer pays not one dollar of pension, but he will now. This year his tax notice will reflect the added charge, and it will grow steadily. There are 411,000 disabled veterans, with their dependent families, who are now being cared for by the government.

Spanish War veterans who are 65 years and older, are being hit hardest by the economy bill. "Our average age is 70 or 75 years," the veterans are closed to men of our age. Most of us are too old to obtain employment.

Two Idaho veterans who are active in the United Spanish War Veterans' national meeting, held last week in Salt Lake City, are making a tour of the state. They are accompanied by the national secretary and are expected to visit the local auxiliary last evening.
