SEARCHERS FAULT RECOVERED BODY OF KIDNAPING VICTIM

Thurmond, Taken to Scene of Crime, Gives Further Details of Brutal Slaying of Brooke L. Hart

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18 (AP)—A search for the body of Brooke L. Hart ended fruitfully tonight after airplane and divers had been used to locate the remains of the kidnaping victim from San Francisco Bay.

Thurmond, who was taken from the city prison here, was quoted by department of justice agents as giving further details of the slaying, to which he and Holmes allegedly had conspired.

The agents said Thurmond disclosed that young Hart, while at school on the bridge with the pilot who was killed, was asked for his life insurance policy.

Thurmond also disclosed, the agents said, that Hart was led to believe he was only being taken to some isolated spot to be robbed and then asked: "Why are you doing this in me?"

At the bridge, after he had been taken with the pilot, and knocked down, young Hart was described by Thurmond in his new statement as being "bludgeoned and pleading: 'Oh, please don't—why are you doing this?'"

The agents quoted Thurmond as saying he minutes later saw an automobile came along and that Hart heard it and despite the smothering of his mouth, he saw the car stop and he was knocked down again, the officers said Thurmond told them he saw a man get out of the car and moaned: "Don't hit me—I have done nothing."

LINES TIGHTEN IN CONFLICTING VIEWS ON MONEY POLICY

Business Demands Return to Gold Standard While President Compares Opponents Of Hi-Ho Scheme to Tories

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 (AP)—The lines were drawn today between the two camps over the return to the gold standard at about the same time that President Roosevelt in a radio address, was likening the opponents of his gold buying policy to the Tories of Great Britain.

The chamber of commerce of the United States, in adopting its monetary resolution, called the experiment of floating a new currency "a policy of widespread confusion and disquiet."

Even as the president was speaking, new demands were being pressed upon him for a broadening of the monetary base to improve the status of silver.

On Capitol Hill, Senator Thomas, Democrat, Oklahoma, Smith, Democrat, South Carolina, and Harrison, Democrat, Missouri, were on the committee representing a group of senators that met yesterday, began to call for a return to the gold standard.

President Roosevelt already had been asked by Senator Philander Claitor, Democrat, Nevada, one of the most vigorous advocates of reestablishing silver, to provide for a limited increase of a commodity produced and used for domestic purposes.

The administration today fixed the price for Reconstruction purposes of purchases of new-mined domestic gold at \$32.26 an ounce, the same amount for the last five days, and just below the world quotation of \$32.26.

The directors of the chamber of commerce, generally considered as representative of business, in their resolution announced by the president, urged that there be an immediate announcement of intention of an early return to a gold standard, with complete avoidance of currency experiments.

In his radio address, President Roosevelt expressed his accord with the resolution and said that among my neighbors, I shall have opportunity to improve my reading of the makers of our history with the thought before me that although problems and terms change the principles of our American self-government remain the same.

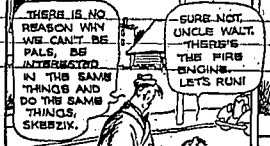
