Consolidation of Gem State Institutions Into New System Announced on Authority of M. S. Eccles

Checks, deposit slips and endorsement stamps in hand may be used and when the present supply is gone may be used by the branch. 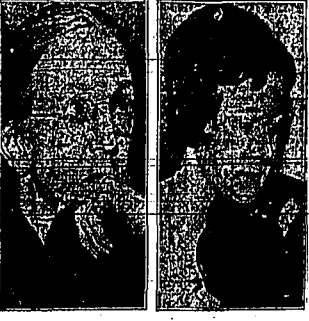

CASSIA STRESSES TAX DELINQUENCY

Proceeds and Auditor Gail Attention to Penalties in Making New Notices

BURLEY, Nov. 25—Cassia county tax notices for 1933 were being mailed out this morning. They number about 6,000 and taxes thereon amount to a total of \$74,000, on an estimate of receipts.

On the eve of the mailing of these notices, the following statement concerning delinquent taxes was released, jointly by the treasurer and auditor:

It is well at this time that attention be called to taxpayers who have, for whatever reason, permitted their taxes to go delinquent for the years 1929, 1930 and 1931. The total delinquent taxes aggregated \$687,000, or that over a period of 1929 to 1931, the county has accumulated \$1,012,133 over and above the figure of October, 1931. It is the policy of the county to collect the credit of the county together with all taxing units therein, but it is desirable that the affairs of the individual taxpayer, and a measure to the property involved, be left as undisturbed as possible, the greater good the difficulty and possible inability to pay them in 1933, as required, and before public sale as required by law, if allowed to continue to such a danger point.

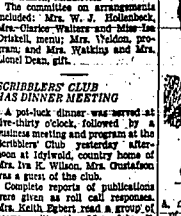

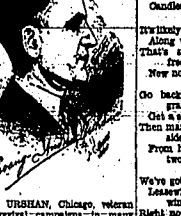

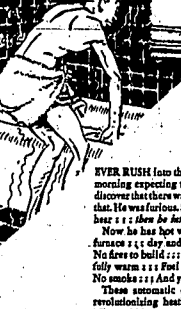

CADETS WIN UNEXPECTEDLY CLOSE GAME, 12 TO 7, Warburton Thrills Throng As Trojans Crush Notre Dame 19 To 0

Navy Unequal to Dazzling Running Of Army's Backs

West Point Team Halts Midshipmen's Drive in Last Half to Hang-Up Ninth Grid Victory of Season

TULLAH, Okla., Nov. 25—Army's gallant warriors boomed a sensational challenge to Army's football supremacy today but it wasn't quite enough to break down the invincible back of the Cadets, who rolled to win an unexpectedly close game, 12 to 7, before a capacity crowd of 7,000 at Franklin field.

Forced to the second straight year by Trojan summer warfare, the biggest and most colorful crowd of the season greeted the Army and Navy action. The game was a special attraction in the first half, then that part of the opening three in the last two periods.

Navy's sturdy, aggressive line sought Army's back in the first half to a standstill, while the strong right half of Pullback Bill Clark gave the Midshipmen repeated advantages in the kicking exchange, but Navy's stiffer back line put the Army in a position of getting the standing runner of Paul Johnson of Ashland, Ohio, the only quarterback, and the team's running mate, Spike Jack Becker.

Clark dashed twice, Johnson, in the first few minutes of the game dashed 81 yards on the run, Becker, in the second period, a 71-yard drive in the second period, romped 36 yards for the second time, and after Walter Deamberger of Glendale, West Virginia, hero of the Navy, had led the Army to a 10-0 lead, a substitute line, Dick Bell of Pittsburgh, had hooked the point that put the Army in the lead.

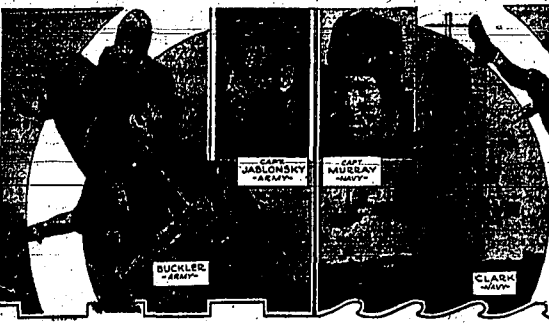

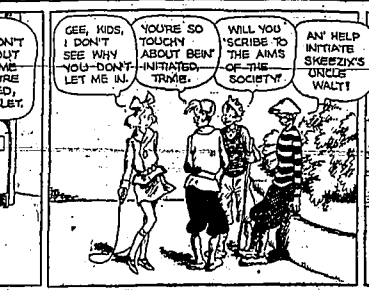
