ARMY'S STRENGTH BELOW DANGER LINE

Chief of Staff MacArthur Warns World Unrest Emphasizes Military Needs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 22 (AP)—General Douglas MacArthur, chief of staff, Sunday reported the army's strength "below the danger line."

"Consider it of the most urgent importance to the United States that this condition be rectified without delay," he said. The chief of staff, warning of a world airplane strength which he said was "well below the danger line," said the world's military strength in the world is "well below the danger line."

The present civilian military system prescribed in the national defense act is almost ideally suited to our requirements, provided only the strength and efficiency of the several elements are maintained at reasonable levels.
